Thus, even if all the countries of the world were on as good terms with each other as Canada and the United States, there would still be an imperative need for an effective United Nations. It would, however, be a very different world and a very different United Nations. In such a world the place of the Security Council would sink to comparative insignificance. Certainly in such a world the energies of all peoples could be directed to the arts of peace, armies and navies could be disbanded, and atomic bombs could be forgotten.

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
