Right Hon. W. L. MACKENZIE KING (Prime Minister): At the present time the fate of nations is being decided on the battlefields of Europe. How soon the decision will come God only knows. One thing we know is that anything that supports our fighting men will hasten that decision. Anything that withholds support that they need, and that is at all within our power to give, may have consequences for them and for us of which I hesitate to speak.

I have been amazed at some of the speeches that have been made in this house during the course of the debate not only to-night, but particularly to-day and yesterday, when one considers what the motion is that is before the house, and when it is apparent that it relates wholly and exclusively to the support that can be given to our fighting men overseas in this sixth year of war.
