QUIMET PLAYED BRILLIANT GOLF

Jerome Travers Among Americans Beaten in First Round at Sandwich.

SANDWICH, Eng., May 18.—Four Americans—Francis Quimet of the Woodland Golf Club, Massachusetts, open golf champion of the United States; Frederick Herreshoff, New York; Charles W. Evans, Jr., Chicago, and Fraser Hale, Chicago, defeated their opponents in the first round today for the British amateur golf championship, and thus qualified for the second stage.

Four other Americans—Jerome D. Travers of Montclair, N.J., amateur golf champion of the United States; Henry J. Topping, Greenwich Country Club, Connecticut; C. W. Inaile, Onondaga Community Club, N.Y.; and Edward S. Knapp, Westbrook—were put out of the tournament by their opponents.

The two other American entrants, Harold Weber of Toledo, Ohio, and Arthur G. Lockwood, Belmont Springs Country Club, Massachusetts, did not play—the former because there was not time for all the contestants to play the first round, and the latter because he had drawn a bye in this round. Both will play tomorrow.

The defeat of Jerome D. Travers caused an even greater sensation, if possible, than his victory in the finals would have done, for he was regarded as the most dangerous of the American competitors. He made no excuse for his defeat, however, saying: "I am chiefly disappointed because I played such poor golf."

Evans, who always seemed to be playing golf, while his opponent C. C. McGregor of Manila, champion of the Philippines, at the turn the American was up and he won the match 7 up and 8 to play.

Evans will meet Herreshoff tomorrow, and Hale will meet Whittow, a youthful Australian champion. The open championship will not play again until Wednesday, when Quimet will meet Tubbs of Littlestone and Herreshoff will meet C. Taylor, who is considered a high-class golfer.
