

RUSSIA MOVES TROOPS TO ATTACK BUKOWINA?

Army Collected on Roumanian Frontier Being Removed Elsewhere.

NEW PLANS ADOPTED

German Report Greater Part of Men Collected for New Offensive.

LONDON, Dec. 19.—(5:53 a.m.)—There has been considerable speculation in London for some time as to what has become of the Russian troops which concentrated on the Roumanian border some weeks ago, with the apparent intention of entering the Balkan conflict. At the time when Russian co-operation in the entente allies' campaign would have been the most crucial, they were described in all reports as poised on the Roumanian frontier, ready for an immediate invasion of Bulgaria, but after weeks of suspense, during which repeated rumors converted Russian troops into a movement into an accomplished fact, it was learned that the Russian invasion had not advanced beyond the preparatory stage.

Recently an absolute lack of new developments regarding the Russian plan in this quarter led most observers to deem that hopes for a Russian intervention were either premature or based upon circumstances since altered. It is now reported that the Russian force is being withdrawn from the Roumanian border. FORD EXPECTS TO END WAR BEFORE SPRING

Has Intimations From Official Source Peace Mission Approved.

BRYAN TO JOIN PARTY

Will Be Over in Time to Attend Sessions of Pacifists at Hague.

CHRISTIANIA, Norway, Dec. 19, via London.—"Every nation in the world will soon look upon the American peace pilgrims as taking the initiative in stopping the world's worst war. The landing of the peace expedition in Europe was recorded as one of the most benevolent acts of the world's most benevolent man, Henry Ford today to the Associated Press on stepping ashore on Norwegian soil.

The steamer Oscar II, carrying the Ford peace expedition, arrived at this port on Saturday after a 14 days' voyage from New York. Mr. Ford was confident the expedition would result in getting the men out of the trenches before the winter was looked upon as a 14 days' voyage from New York. After holding meetings while crossing the Atlantic and disagreeing over the question of the American preparedness policy the 140 peace advocates on arriving were anxious to learn what attitude would be adopted towards them by European states.

Just before the Oscar II reached Christiania the Ford guests held a public meeting at which the speaker, Mr. Ford, said that unless the peace expedition was successful, the world's situation would be a serious one. He declared that the peace expedition was necessary and that it was his duty to lead it. He also said that the peace party was not related to the peace party.
