Comparing the movements out of the States during corresponding nine months' periods of the last three fiscal years, exports, to Canada have increased from \$323,475 in 1909 to \$2,500,810 in 1910, and \$3,884,447 in 1911: those to the United Kingdom from \$921,524 in 1909 to \$1,244,600 in 1910 and \$1,657,990 in 1911.
