
EXPRESS ROBBERY CASE GOES TO TRIAL MONDAY

Many Witnesses Called by Police - Radial Project is Again in the Air.

HAMILTON, Dec. 15. (Special.) - The police to-day announced that they would be ready to proceed with the preliminary hearing of J. D. Chilton and Joseph Achon, charged with theft of \$3000 from the Canadian Express Company when their remand expires next Monday.
