Notwithstanding the inclement weather yesterday, the electors of the Township of Etobicoke took a half holiday and attended the Islington nominations for reeve, deputy reeve and councillors. Sharp at 1 o'clock, L. L. Macpherson, the township clerk, called the audience to order and stated that he was ready to receive the nominations for the several offices. Many Dropped Out.
A public meeting followed the nomination and John Gardhouse, warden of York County, was the first speaker. He declined his nomination. The meeting was the liveliest in the history of the township. The following gentlemen dropped out of the contest: F. B. Lockwood and John Bryans, for reeve, leaving J. M. Gardhouse and Charles Silverthorne.

James Dandridge and Robert Eastwood are in the field. Dr. E. Bull declined. The two seats for councillors are being contested by Thomas Delworth, Sam Wright, George Whitworth and James Elliott, as Frank Reeves and Robert Eastwood retired.

It is expected that Mr. Elliott will also tender his resignation today.

Considering the make-up of the candidates, their fighting qualities and services rendered the township, it is easy to predict that J. M. Gardhouse

will be next year's reeve, and he is justly entitled to the honor, having served the township for six years, namely, three years as councillor and three years as deputy reeve.

Scarboro Nominations.
The nominations for reeve, deputy reeve and councillors took place at Woburn yesterday afternoon, with the following results:

For Reeve.
W. H. Patterson and James G. Cornell.

Robert Ormerod was elected deputy reeve by acclamation, and the three seats for councillors are being contested by J. G. Stewart, George B. Little, J. W. Cowan, Robert McCowan, William Doherty and T. A. Patterson.

In the whole slate there are only two men who sat on last year's council, namely, James G. Cornell, who was deputy reeve last year, and is aspiring for the reeveship now, and Robert Ormerod, who was elected deputy reeve by acclamation.

Five Generations at Funeral.
Five generations of the Cooper family attended the funeral Saturday of Mrs. Archibald Cooper of Glen Williams.

Mrs. Cooper was 94 years of age and had lived for 70 years in the one house on the Credit River banks and Glen Williams.

York Township Council.
The council of the Township of York held their final meeting of the year yesterday afternoon, with all the members present.

A communication was received from Township Solicitor T. R. L. Starr, in relation to the Sunday School, forming the council that contrary to the claim of L. Davis and his solicitor, Sibbey, avenue is a public highway and was dedicated as a road, and as parties have bought lands on the plan no one has a right to build a fence shutting off their rights.

The trustees of school section No. 81, Downview, send in the following resolution:

"In view of the fact that the trustees of S.S. No. 17 and 18, West York, cannot agree upon the value of the school property of S.S. No. 17, we, the trustees of S.S. No. 81 hereby authorize the secretary to ask the council of the Township of York to appoint arbitrators to take such steps as may be necessary to have the matter properly adjusted. This matter is left over for the new council to deal with."

The reeve and the treasurer were authorized to pay the county levy for the year 1912, amounting to \$19,967.98.

The principal business transacted was the clearing up of outstanding accounts, after which the members made valedictory speeches.

BRAMPTON, Dec. 30.—The sixty-fourth anniversary services of Grace Church Sunday School were held yesterday. The preacher was Rev. S. J. Bartlett, of Toronto. A special meeting of the Town Council, Board of Trade and Public School Board, was called for Saturday night, to discuss the proposed plans for the new Public School Building to be erected in town. The bylaw to raise \$40,000 for that purpose is to be submitted to the electors at a referendum day, and the Public School Board had decided on plans prepared by a Quebec firm of architects, J. H. Boulton.
