## WHERE TEETH ARE WORSHIPPED

An American traveler recently delivered a lecture before a distinguished audience at the home of a wealthy New Yorker. On the table before him stood one lone object.

Said the traveler, "While I was in India, three Royal Commissioners were sent there by the King of Siam to see that the people of that country were not neglecting their teeth. They failed in their mission, however, their offer of the surprising sum of \$250,000 for the much-coveted teeth being declined."

"The tooth in question came, as the Hindus believe, from out the mouth of Buddha—the founder of the foremost religion of the Orient—and hence for 2400 years that tooth has been an object of worship."

"It is enclosed in a golden casket in a shrine in the Great Indian Temple at Kandy, and attracts thousands of worshippers pilgrims from far and near every year, and has never been exposed to the gaze of an unbeliever."

"In hundreds of other shrines in India, the teeth of human beings are worshipped by Hindus, who above all, value good teeth as the reward of good ancestry and of vigilant vigilance in the care of the body."

## WOULD BORROW \$3,000,000 ON ONTARIO REVENUE FUNDS

Col. Matheson Prefers It in Bonds or Inscribed Stock.

Several bills of importance were put thru the committee stage on Wednesday, and in addition two government measures were introduced.

An act introduced by the provincial treasurer, to raise money on the consolidated revenue funds of Ontario, amounting to the securing of a loan of \$3,000,000 in the form of bonds or inscribed stock. It would be, he said, on the same lines as the loan made last year, of which amount \$1,900,000 still remained. The province had authority for the raising of a larger sum if desired. Col. Matheson pointed out that the Dominion government was now offering 3 1/2 per cent. bonds, and the Ontario government would have to offer inducements.

It was provided that the bonds or stock issued should be free from all provincial taxes, including succession duties, following the precedent of the imperial act as to government annuities.

"You will get 96," suggested Hon. Mr. Ross, to which Col. Matheson replied confidently, "We will get 100."

"I hope the treasurer won't be satisfied with \$25,000," remarked the premier, usually.

"He didn't get that before," returned Mr. Ross, promptly.

"That's just what we can't find out," retorted Mr. Whitney, and the bout was off.

The three millions will be expended on the Temiskaming Railway, \$1,900,000 to pay back into the consolidated revenue fund taken from last year, and the other million odd to continue the work to the end of the second contract, which will be to Lake Abitibi, or 215 miles from North Bay.

Col. Matheson hopes still for the Dominion subsidy. If it is not paid the road possibly may not be extended to a junction with the Grand Trunk Pacific, some 45 miles farther north.

**Mines Bill.**  
Hon. Frank Cochrane gave an explanation of his mines bill, a synopsis of which was given some days ago.

Mr. Ross asked the intention of the minister regarding royalties, and Mr. Cochrane replied that they would be provided for in a subsequent bill.

The ex-premier spoke of the importance of the mining industry, and hoped there was some in the bill to discourage the prospector. He cordially approved of the feature which would prevent a prospector squandering upon a mine some \$100,000 before he was permitted later, as he had not had time to digest the bill.

**Back on the Paper.**  
On motion of Hon. Dr. Pyne a bill of Alex. McKinnon, respecting certificates of companies, which was stricken off the order paper the other day, was replaced on the paper, Dr. Pyne explaining that it was a new bill.

Several readings were given the following bills: Respecting the City of Peterboro (Bradburn); respecting the City of London (Downey); respecting the Township of Eastnor (Bowman).

**Downey's Bill Amended.**  
Mr. Downey's Pharmacy Act amendment was taken up in committee by the whole house. Mr. Downey said the original intent was to declare that all or part of a business should be registered pharmacists, but the special committee on the bill changed this to majority of directors.

Mr. Ross said the present act was in the interests of the public, since companies were compelled to employ a qualified person.

Mr. Downey said of his bill its object was to protect the public from fake companies—to stop companies from doing that which it was unlawful for persons to do. He insisted that the case of an individual being fined \$5 for violating the act, while a corporation which had offended in exactly the same way could not be got at, the magistrate treating the prosecutor that his only recourse was to sue the company for 15 cents.

Mr. Ross, however, held to the view that as long as the person who dispensed the drugs was a qualified pharmacist, that was all the protection the public required.

The government had no attitude on the bill, observed the premier, in reply to Mr. Ross' query on this point.
