THE BANKERS TO THE SOUTH OUGHT TO WAIT... Washington, May 1—After a sharp fight, the House Committee on Immigration to-day reported favorably Mr. Mahany's immigration bill, by a vote of five to four.

Washington, May 1—After a sharp fight, the House Committee on Immigration to-day reported favorably Mr. Mahany's immigration bill, by a vote of five to four. Chairman Bartholdi is opposed to restriction and used his influence to defeat the bill. The debate in committee was a long one. The majority of the committee will be opposing to the labor men of the United States, in whose interests it is mainly framed, and who have tried for the last four years to secure its passage. The bill prohibits the daily incoming of Canadians to this country to perform labor of any kind while they retain their domicile in the foreign country. It makes it unlawful for citizens of the United States, who took out their naturalization papers to avoid the present law, to work in this country and have a domicile in the foreign country. Under the bill, unlawful immigrants may be deported any time within two years after their arrival, and violation of the immigration laws are made a misdemeanor. At present there is no criminal penalty. United States commissioners are invested with judicial powers for the trial of all minor cases. The bill makes it unlawful for Canadian sailing vessels to ship on American vessels of the great lakes, unless they have resided in this country for six months prior to their engagement. As the season lasts about six months, the alien seaman is practically alive in the United States practically all the time.

THEY ARE UNDER REV. MR. SUITT... CHARGE AGAINST HIM WILL BE LAID BEFORE THE NEXT BISHOP... St. Catharines, May 1—When at Easter about two-thirds of the members of St. Barnabas Church left the fold on account of the conduct of their rector, the Rev. C. H. Suitt, a committee of the disgraced members was formed to consider what action should be taken to restore the church of discipline and bring about a better state of things. The committee has been at work since, and has formulated charges which will be forwarded to the next synod as soon as he is elected. There is much comment in the city over the attempts that are being made to smother up the grave offences alleged, and the church people have determined to push the matter to a conclusion, either through the church of the courts.

MANY BODIES COMING UP... The Search for Dead Infants in the Thames Continues... New York, May 1—A Journal London special says: The supply of bodies of children thrown into the Thames by Mrs. Ann Dyer seems inexhaustible. Another body was fished up yesterday, making the seventh since the dredging operations a brick which weighed a couple, dropped on the surface. The police are now examining the bottom of Clapper's Pool by means of a search light, and many more bodies, it is believed, will be found.
