BREAK IN PRICE OF WHEAT.

May Option Opened Near 75c and Closed About 73c.

Speculators Who Have Bullied Futures—Realized Profits Yesterday—Liverpool Opened Strong and Eased Off—Paris Strong—Corn Markets Off—Cheese and Butter for Export—Local Markets—Notes and Gossip.

Friday Evening, April 14. Liverpool wheat futures advanced a clear penny per cent over night and lost nearly half the gain before the close.

Paris wheat futures advanced 15 centimes to-day and flour 5 to 10 centimes. This was another active day in the Chicago pit. Futures opened at an advance of three-quarters of a cent over Thursday's close and held steady for a time, a good cash demand and some enquiries from the Continent being reported. The market soon gave way, however, under a heavy realizing movement and prices dropped a clear two cents, closing with a net loss for the session of about 3/4c. Bull speculators continue to report serious damage to winter wheat, and until this question is cleared up the market will be dominated by it.

Liverpool maize futures advanced over night, but declined and closed at about Thursday's final figure. Chicago corn receded 3/4c and closed near the Liverpool for the day.

Wheat declined 1/2c to 3/4c at Liverpool. Wheat receipts at Liverpool the past three days 300,000 cwt., of which 320,000 cwt. was American. Corn, same time, 2,320,000 cwt. of American. Argentina wheat shipments the past week: Wheat 2,422,000 bushels; corn 100,000 bushels. Shipments for corresponding week 1898: Wheat 1,000,000 bushels; corn 45,000 bushels.

Trade was easy. On account of the lower market reports from outside places, the bid wanted, the scarcity of spot on the boats, and the absence of a number of outside buyers, prices for all classes of fat cattle were lower, especially for the inferior grades, of which there were too many.

The packers at these places do not cut so much as the Toronto packers and the Hamilton dealers were offering and paying \$4.40 per cwt. for our men, while the Toronto packers are offering \$4.75 per cwt. At the same time the Hamilton men were not cutting out nearly so much as our packers.
