Issuing a despatch from Cape Town, dated Monday, Jan, 1, as follows: French reports at 2 p.m. to-day from Coleskop, by hellograph, as follows: "Leav-ing at Rensburg, holding the enemy in front, half of the First Suffolks and a sec-tion of the Royal Horse Artillery, I started thence at 5 in the afternoon, Dec. 31, tak-ing with me five squadrons of cavatry, half of the Second Berks and 80 mounted in-fantry, infantry carried in wagons, and 10 gums. I halted for four hours at Maldor's farm, and at 3.30 this morning occupied the kopie overlooking and westward of Colesberg. The enemy's outposts were tak-en completely by surprise.
