At a special general meeting of the Bell Telephone Co., the Council met the company at Oitawa several times during the past few years in opposition to their requests for power to raise rates to an extent which the Council considered should not be granted. The Counmittee of the Dominion Senate reported favorably on the application of the company, but the matter was not allowed to rest there, and in conjunction with the city a continuous influential canvass was made amongst the members of the senate with the result that the company's bill was withdrawn.

"This is a matter," said Mr. Ames, "which it will be well for future council to watch from time to time, as the Bell Telephone Co. are very persevering in trying to get, in some form or other, powers to very materially increase their rates. I am satisfied that the defeating of their bill at the last session of the senate means a saving to the users of the company's instruments in the City of Toronto alone of from \$100,000 to \$200,000
