WILL FIGHT MR. MACLEAN'S BILL EVEN TO THE LAST DITCH RAILWAY OFFICIALS AT OTTAWA TO AUDITOR'S RESIGNATION

Representatives of Many Lines Doing Business in Canada Reach the Capital Keen to Oppose Campaign for Two-Cent

Passenger Rate,

Ottawa, June 27.—(Special.)—To night representatives of the Canadian Pacific, the Grand Trunk, some smaller Canadian lines, and several American railway companies, held a meeting to agree upon common lines of action to head off the movement for lower passenger rates in Canada. To-morrow they will appear before the railway committee, when it is expected there will be a lively time in connection with Mr. Maclean's bill to amend the Railway Act.

Mr. Maclean proposes to apply the provisions of the Michigan Act to Canada in the matter of passenger rates. One of his strongest arguments is the fact that the railways operating in both Canada and the United States give a two-cent passenger rate to the people of New York and Michigan and charge Canadians at the rate of 3c a mile. The railway representatives who are here will be asked to explain why Canadians should be thus discriminated against.

Among the prominent railway men who talked the situation over to night were: O. W. Ruggles and W. H. Underwood, Chicago; C. E. E. Ussher of the C.P.R.; Mr. Bell of the G.T.R.; J. B. Morford, assistant general manager of the Michigan Central; F. Backus of the Toronto, Hamilton & Buffalo line; A. Patrick of the Pere Marquette line, and H. F. Moeller of the same company.

The Pere Marquette line is the one which the Canada Southern is trying to acquire thru a bill now before parliament. This bill was held up by W. F. Maclean on the ground that no legislation should be granted till the Canada Southern gives to Canada the same right which it gives to the people of Michigan

This afternoon the visiting railway men were given a drive about the city. They declined to indicate the nature of the conclusions which they reached to-night.
