137,000 tons. Inside is a most

wonderful echo, best heard from the

center of the building. As a whispering

gallery there is, perhaps, no such

building in the world, not even the

famous Mormon temple.

**ANGELIC MINISTERS
WERE HUSTLERS**

Practical Lessons Drawn From
Lot's Narrow Escape From
the City of Sodom.

"The Christian should be never off

duty," said Rev. T. T. Shields, last

night in Adelaide Street Church in

dealing with his subject, "Mini ters

hustle." Taking as his text Gen. xix,

15, 16, Paul's counsel to Timothy was,

"Be instant in season and out of season."

Sin is unceasingly at work. The

devil sets as many traps in the summer

as in the winter, and death is always

busy. "I believe in special evangelistic

service, such as were held lately in

the city," said, "but I believe

we ought to be always seeking souls

the year around." The minister referred

to the text where angels of God, who did

not think it beneath their dignity to

rescue Lot from the doomed city. There

are some ministers who are engaged in

discussing great theological problems; they

are very churchy, but they rather pity

the poor soul who devotes his life to

evangelizing the lost.

It was not beneath the dignity of the

Son of God to come to save men. We

should be those of a servant, and we

come in contact with the lost. The

message of these angel ministers was

to speak of the city's iniquity. To

understand the love of God we must see

the dark background of sin behind the

cross. Sin drove the nails into the

Savior's hands, side, and thrust

the spear into his side. Sin is a robber

and a murderer. Sin must be atoned

for. There is no salvation in good

works—they are the fruit, not the price

of salvation. Lot had to leave Sodom

and flee to the mountain. The sinner

must forsake his sin and fly to Cal-

vary.

These angel ministers were in haste.

They began their work of rescue when

the morning broke, though there were

no signs of approaching doom. They

hastened Lot, for they were in earnest

to "lead him out of the city." "Go as

the Master did," said the preacher,

"and pluck men as brands from the

burning." Mr. Shields closed with an

earnest appeal to the unconvinced to

trust in the Savior who has said, "Him

that cometh unto me I will in no wise

cast out."

At the close of the evening sermon

four candidates for membership were

baptized. A feature of the services

was the singing of a selection "Praise

Ye the Lord," in which Miss Raymond

(soprano), Mr. Charles Maynard

(tenor), and Mr. E. Gardner (bass),

took part.
