In view of the fact that the board of health has a ssurance that the epidemic of Spani influenza is abating in the city or yielding perceptibly to the treatment so far prescribed in the closing schools, churches, theatres, etc., and the forbidding of all public gatherings, it has been decided that further steps are necessary, and these were promulgated at a special meeting of the board heid on Wednesday afternoon.

First, the public library is to be closed immediately, and all books now out are to be disinfected on their return. The likelihood of these books carrying the influenza germs from person to person was apparent, and it was considered wise that this be eliminated without further delay.

Fountains To Be Closed.

While bubbling fountains are recognized as the most sanitary of public drinking contrivances, the board believed these might be assisting in the spread of the disease, so they will be shut off at once to avoid even the suspicion of dahger.
