In spite of statements to the contrary, we know there has been no increase in the normal number of drug addicts since the inception of the Ontario temperance act. The only class in which there has been an increase is that of soldiers, who having received terrible wounds, needed prolonged use of narcotics to relieve their pain. Some of these have innocently contracted drug addiction, but aside from them there have been fewer new drug addicts since 1916 than was the average before the Ontario temperance act came before the Ontario temperance act came

Denies Existence of Figures. To prove their statement on this point the Citizen's Liberty League quote what are said to be Government figures purporting to show an enormous increase in drug consumption in Canada since 1916. There are no government or other figures available which can show any increase in the consumption of drugs in Canada during that period.

There has been an increase in the amount of narcotic drugs handled by the trade since 1916, but this increase in the trade—was not consumed in Canada, and the high officers of the Citizens' Liberty League know it.

It forbids the sale of narcotic drugs to addicts or others except upon the presentation of special order blanks issued by the government. "You D—— fools keep quiet," shouted another Beckite.

"My wife found that some of the linen was sadly worn out down there and gave some \$2,000 of her money for new linen before she went awy last spring," went on Sir Adam. "I want British fair play here and I'm going to get it.

Sir Adam Beck told the audience that he paid his head gardener \$25 a week, while his groom had a nice clean room over the stables, with a bath and everything. He got \$20 a week. (Decisive cheers from the rear.)
