

TOWNSHIPS DO NOT WANT GOVERNMENT LOANS FOR ROADS

Not Likely To Take Advantage of Offer, Says County Engineer Talbot.

It is not likely that any of the townships in the County of Middlesex will take advantage of the offer of the Government of a loan of money without interest for a period of five years for the purpose of improving the roads, according to County Engineer C. Talbot. The farmers, he said, in the county had always shown indications that they would rather pay for the construction and upkeep of the roads as they went.

A loan of a considerable sum of money would be of no use to a township unless that township had a considerable building program ahead of i and intended to construct new roads he thought. There was little construc-tion to be done in the county of Mid-dlesex, and the county was rich enough to bear the cost without outside assist-

ance.

Great Aversion.

"The farmers have always shown a great aversion to the assuming of debts, and at the present time the County of Middlesex owes little money," he said. "No debentures except those for schools and ditching have been issued and by adding three or four mills to the tax rate the whole debt of the county could be wiped out.

"The only use which such a loan could be put to would be for the construction of bridges. At the present time there is one big bridge to be built, and that is in the township of Ekfrid. It is very improbable that money would be borrowed by any township for the

AMALGAMATE WITH

Development For East Single Organization For All

By an unanimous vote, the London post of the Grand Army of Canada decided in favor of amalgamation with the United Veterans' League at a meeting held last night. Such a vote is being taken in every post, both of the G. A. C. and the U. V. L. throughout Canada, and according to J. F. Marsh, the Dominion organizer, the returns so far show that every post is in favor of the amalgamation.

Mr. Marsh dealt chiefly with the gratuity question during his address. He said that the Government could afford to pay the sums asked for in the petition, \$2,000, \$1,500 and \$1,000, respectively. The scheme would cost the Government approximately \$400,000, and this weild mean a cost of \$24,000,000 in interest annually. According to a report made by the Hon. Mr. Crerar, a tax of one per cent placed upon natural resources would raise \$80,000,000 annually, leaving \$56,000,000 each year to pay off the principal. cipal.
