NORWAY. Council Will Be Asked to Take Some Action at Once.

NORWAY, March 23.—(Special.)—Residents of Coxwell and Reid-avenue north of the Grand Trunk Railway tracks have a genuine grievance against the York Township council, and one which is being expressed in vigorous terms.

South of the G.T.R. both of these streets are thickly populated as far as Queen-street, while the roadway has been placed in good repair, and considerable sidewalk put down.

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INSPECTION AT FACTORY FAVORS BREAD BUYERS

Where Municipalities Have Adopted System in Western Ontario Results Have Been Good.

That Mr. McNaught's "bread bill" introduced in the legislature last week is decidedly in the interest of manufacturer and consumer alike was the opinion given yesterday by a well-known baker from Western Ontario.

"The system of factory inspection will be especially valuable," he declared, "I know that just now manufacturers in several cities and towns in Western Ontario have the bread inspected at the factory under the regulations of municipal by-laws, the inspectors being appointed by the municipality."

"As a result the whole of the product or output of each particular factory is subject to inspection both as to adulterated matter and weight. Also the inspector, who is usually a health officer, by coming to the factory, gains a thorough knowledge of the sanitary conditions under which bread is made, something which is very rarely done now where factory inspection does not exist, and we in Western Ontario think that the sanitary conditions under which bread is made is of as great importance as the weight of bread going to the public."

Where factory inspection does not exist, the bread is weighed at the store, but only about fifty per cent. of the bread produced goes into the stores now, so that the balance of the output is not inspected at all, for it goes to the consumer direct. The McNaught bill will place the whole product of the factory under the inspection of the proper authorities, and the private consumer who takes bread from the wagon will enjoy the same measure of protection as the one who obtains supply from the retail grocer.

"Moreover the weighing of bread at the factory means a greater incentive to better bread, which means a healthier bread. Under existing conditions, the tendency is to draw from the oven at the earliest possible moment, and the bread is baked twenty-four hours after it is baked."

"Another fact is of interest in connection with this bread question. One of the peculiarities of bread-baking is that the larger the loaf the colder the oven, and it consequently takes longer to ferment, and is very likely to be over-baked. Sourd bread has been practically unheard of since the two and four-pound loaves have been abandoned."

The Grocers' Section of the Retail Merchants' Association of Ontario have endorsed Mr. McNaught's idea of factory inspection. They feel it to be the most satisfactory method of preventing short weight, and are venting their opinion for complete inspection of every loaf, an impossibility under the present inspection."

CONSUMERS PROTEST. Object to Increase of Price for Natural Gas.

ST. CATHARINES, March 23.—Natural gas consumers from end to end of the city are up in arms and are threatening to have the fixtures removed from the houses and to have nothing more to do with the United Gas Company, which has a franchise for supplying the city.

The discontent is caused by a notice published to-day to the effect that, beginning with meter readings for April, the price for domestic use will be 55 cents a thousand, with 5 per cent. discount for prompt payment. Heretofore the price had been 40 cents, with 10 per cent. discount, and consumers feel that the price is exorbitant.

Last winter the company gave a discount of 20c to consumers using over 75,000 feet, but this year only a straight discount of 10c is given.

The company explains that it will have to expend large sums on drilling wells during the summer.
