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## BIG PROGRAM OF SPORTS AT THE BEACHES

Mimico Has Great Crowd at Annual Fete—Odds and Ends of Events in the Suburbs.

WEST TORONTO, Aug. 3.—Harry, the three-year-old son of H. C. Lewis, 333 Quebec-avenue, got lost this afternoon and had not been found until a late hour to-night. He is of dark complexion and was dressed in a blouse and overalls.

The holiday passed off quietly and without any untoward incident. Many people left town on Saturday evening and did not return until this evening. The C.P.R. station was packed with people from 8 o'clock till after 9, waiting for the return of the Tottenham Old Boys' and the Guelph Old Boys' excursions. Both these outings were well patronized by West Toronto people.

The peace of Weston-road was disturbed this afternoon by J. L. Row, a tree, who was acting in a most disorderly manner at the Union Station Horse Exchange. P. C. Hughes arrived on the scene and took Row into the police station. He was placed in the cells and will appear to-morrow morning before Magistrate Ellis.

The funeral of Mona, youngest child of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Lodge of Mount Dennis, took place this morning at Prospect Cemetery.

Alderman Armstrong left this morning for Thorold to attend the convention of the Provincial Volunteer Firemen's Association, held here this afternoon.

The cottages were handsomely draped and presented a striking appearance. The light trestle-work and tapering at each end to a point. Capt. **FARMAN'S AEROPLANE SAILS, TOO.**  
NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—Three successful flights in his aeroplane were made by Henry Farman, the aviator, at the Brighton Beach race course to-day. On one of the flights Farman traversed the entire distance of the course, about 800 yards. The machine was 20 feet above the ground. To-morrow Farman hopes to display the aeroplane's capacity to turn around in the air.

bags such as one seen in banking establishments for the preservation of coin of the realm. But Capt. Beachey does not convey his wealth about in this fashion. It is another sort of dust that fills the bags, and they are merely intended to add that weight to the captain's equipment in the air which money bags give the establishment of the lighter, on solid earth.

The big white silk vegetable marrow is inflated with hydrogen which the captain generates himself with acids and iron and water. It costs \$75 to fill up the big balloon, and hydrogen being the lightest of all known substances and only one-fourteenth the weight of air, the ship acquires great buoyancy from this source. The very lightness of the contrivance is in itself one of the difficulties to be overcome in aerial navigation, as a breeze over twelve miles an hour renders navigation dangerous, if not impossible. Yesterday the wind flickered and wavered and veered and blew. The morning trial had to be abandoned and the afternoon was on with the brisk breezes setting lakeward.

The government is not too encouraging to airship ventures, and Capt. Beachey was compelled to put up \$200 as a guarantee that he would not leave his airship in Canada. He will get his \$200 back when he returns to the United States and is quite satisfied with this prospect. Meanwhile the infant industry of building airships in Canada is carefully fostered.

Capt. Beachey's ship only weighs 210 pounds all told, the motor which operates the revolving propeller in front being responsible for 49 pounds. The vegetable marrow bag is 55 feet long and 14 1-2 feet in diameter. The slender framework below is about 40 feet

## GUELPH SHOW A SUCCESS.

Old Boys Picked Home From All Parts of the Province.

GUELPH, Aug. 3.—(Special.)—This to-day practically marked only the opening of old home week, the crowds of old boys and girls who poured into the city on every train were such as to guarantee that the celebration will be a success in every way.

This morning at 10.30 a big excursion train from Toronto, filled with ex-Guelphites, headed by a pipers band arrived. The Detroit Old Guelph boys, a particularly strong aggregation, arrived shortly after noon, bringing with them the Detroit Marine Band. About 125 more Guelph old boys came from Cleveland as well as quite a crowd from Buffalo. Oriental Lodge No. 51 came from Stratford this morning, and some have figured prominently in their gorgeous red and yellow dress in the parades.

The citizens parade leaving the city hall at 1.15 and the evening parade at 7.30 were both successes. Madame La Froit, who is 7 foot 2 inches in height, was dressed in a diaphanous gown and made a great hit.

A ball game at the park between St. Andrews of Toronto and Maple Leafs of Guelph resulted in a win for the former by 8 to 6. The horse race contest was won by Paris in 41 1-2 seconds; St. Mary's second, 51 1-2 seconds.
