

Foster asked that the board of control's report recommending the acceptance of tenders for the construction of the water filtration system be referred back to the board (with histographics to confer with Park). system be referred back to the board "with instructions to confer with Prof. Galbraith of the school of applied science of Toronto University, with a view to having him recommend a reputable independent engineer to report upon the feasibility of extending the intake pipe out into deeper water, with the estimated cost of doing the work, and that pending the receipt of the report of the said engineer no action be taken on the tenders for the filtration system.

The amendment, moved by Controller Geary, asked that the board of control's report should be referred back with instructions to obtain further information as to the condition of the city's drinking water, both as to the present condition and the probale future condition, when the trunk
