THE PRINCESS DE SAGAN WILL PROBABLY LOSE HER CHILDREN Prince De Sagan's Purple Past Ruthlessly Laid Bare in French Court Yesterday—He Was a Gay Blade Even After He Annexed Anna Gould's Millions.

Paris, Nov. 25.—The first day of proceedings in the suit of Count Boni de Castellane against his former wife, who was Miss Anna Gould, of New York, and who is now the wife of Prince Heli de Sagan, for the custody of his three children, were characterized by a strong denunciation of the prince and princess by M. Bonnet, who represented Count de Castellane.

NOBEL PRIZE FOR PROF. RUTHERFORD Former McGill Professor Receives High Recognition. Montreal, Nov. 25.—A London cable says: It is unofficially stated that the Nobel prize will be awarded Professor Ernest Rutherford of Manchester University, formerly of McGill University, Montreal.

Professor Rutherford is one of the most distinguished authorities in the world on radium and radioactivity. In 1905, while he was Macdonald professor of physics at McGill, he received the Rumford medal from the Royal Society of Great Britain. Only a few weeks ago Prof. Rutherford succeeded in proving experimentally the truth of the atomic theory.
