

### **BLAZE ON THE**

This morning about 4.40 o'clock the tug Neptune, lying at the end of Merritt's Neptune, lying at the end of Merritt's wharf, was discovered on fire by Herbert Green, night watchman of the new coal pocket at the North wharf, from which place he first saw the reflection of the flames. He shouted to those on board the tug, but could get no answer. With that he ran up the North wharf and sent the alarm in from Box No. 6. There were two men on board the tug at the time, but they were sleeping in the forward part of the tug, and just before the arrival of the fire apparatus they awoke to find their vessel on fire. The fire caught around the smoke stack, on the wood work, and then it got into a large number of life preservers that were in a large box on the hurricane deck. Considerable damage was done to the engine room, and some of the machinery and copper pipe was destroyed. The firemen's prompt reply to the alarm probably saved the tug. The tug Dirigo was lying beside the Neptune at the time and those on board her rendered valuable assistance.

The work was going on nicely when a boulder was struck and the bucket small put out of usefulness.
