SIR MACKENZIE BOWELL DEAD

Belleville, Ont., Dec. 10.—Sir Mackenzie Bowell died this evening at 7.40, following a week's illness.

The late Sir Mackenzie Bowell was born in Rickingham, Suffolk, England, on December 27, 1823, the son of John Bowell, a carpenter and builder, coming to Canada with his parents in 1838. In 1854 he entered the office of the Belleville Intelligencer as a "printer's devil" from which he climbed to the editorship and proprietorship of the paper, which he held ever since. He was thus the "Nestor of Canadian Journalism." He entered the house of commons in 1867 as member for North Hastings, serving until twenty-six years later when he was appointed to the senate, where he was leader of the Conservative forces till 1906. He was minister of customs in the Macdonald cabinet in 1878, minister of militia in the Abbott government and as minister of trade and commerce in the cabinet of Sir John Thompson in 1898 visited Australia, where he arranged for the holding of the second inter-colonial conference, which resulted in the institution of imperial conferences in London.

On December 21, 1894, he succeeded the late Sir John Thompson as premier, taking also the office of president of the council, holding office till 1896. He was knighted on January 1, 1895. The veteran Canadian statesman was also a veteran of the Fenian Raid of 1866. He was a leader in the Orange order, holding, at one time, the office of grand master. He was president of the Imperial Association of Canada, a governor of Toronto University, and a member of the senate of Albert College (Methodist).

In 1847 he married Harriett Louise Moore, who died in 1864. Two sons survive him—J. M. Bowell, collector of customs at Vancouver, and C. J. Bowell, editor of the Belleville Intelligencer. Three daughters also survive—Mrs. J. G. Jamieson, St. Paul (Minn.); Mrs. George W. McCarthy and Mrs. Charles P. Melton, Belleville.

A grandson, Private Ian MacKenzie Bowell, was wounded in France in 1916.

WILL TAKE LOT MORE MEN TO PUT KAISER IN PLACE

Letter from Peter Harding, Wounded St. John Soldier, is Recruiting Plea

Mrs. Peter Harding of 80 Sheriff street has received the following letter from her husband, Private Peter Harding, who was recently wounded and is at present in a hospital in England. He writes: "My Dear Katie, I received your letter, dated October 9, before I left Belgium and I did not get any letters since, and I will not get any because they all go to Belgium. I am glad to hear that you are all well. I answered the last letter on the day before I was wounded, that was on Nov. 11. I am glad to get out of it as I did, for he put a terrible barrage on us. I was wounded by gunshot and the shells were landed around me very fast. I was shot right through the thigh. The bullet entered one side and passed through my body, going out the other side. There were many of the boys who had their limbs blown off and many were killed in the same engagement. I am in a London hospital and am getting along fine. It is a good hospital. As you know, I was eleven months in France and Belgium before I was hit. The wound is yet quite sore. I tell you it will take a lot of men to finish this terrible war. Every man that is able should come out and help to beat the Germans. I met some of the 119th boys in Belgium and they were all fine. I was very much pleased to meet them."

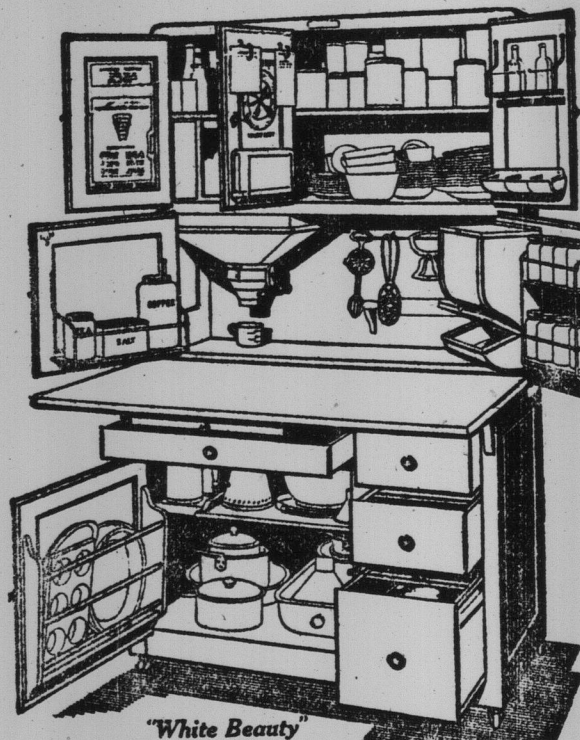
