## SAYS IT IS CASE OF MISTAKEN IDENTITY

Alex. P. Macaulay, a Toronto mining broker, under arrest in St. Louis, Mo., charged with a series of frauds extending over several years. He denies the charges in toto and is fighting extradition. His Canadian friends assert his innocence and say he is the victim of mistaken identity. Every Christmas for some years past bogus travelers' checks in the name of a Canadian bank were cashed in the United States, mainly New York, by a stranger who became known to the police as "Christmas Macaulay." Witnesses have sworn that Macaulay was the man who on December 23, the day on which the police alleged he cashed a check in New York. His stenographer testifies that on December 22 he bought a ticket to Toronto for St. Louis. It is believed he will succeed in proving an alibi.

## POTATOES JUMP IN PRICE IN YORK COUNTY

Fredericton, Tuesday.—Potatoes are selling at \$4.50 a barrel at Canterbury Station today and the farmers are offering them more freely than at any time for the last few weeks.

This statement was made to The Freeman today by a resident at Canterbury Station who also remarked that at further points along the C. P. R. 85 a barrel of potatoes would fetch a price heretofore unheard of. At all points the potato shipments have increased during the last ten days and the farmers who have been holding their supply are now contracting with the dealers. In Fredericton potato prices have also taken a jump and local dealers are now paying \$4 a barrel for potatoes sent from Fredericton, the price at present being \$1 a barrel.

## THE MARKETS AT A GLANCE

("Hardware and Metal," Jan. 27.) Features of the week in hardware markets have been considerable advances in the prices of bar iron and steel, horse shoes, wrought iron washers, axes, cut nails, steel hardware and many other lines. Cut nails have advanced 25 cents a keg, with further advances in sight. Iron metals are firm, with prices with slight advances recorded in some instances. The lead market continues firm, but with an improvement in price, with slight advances recorded in some instances. Wholesalers and retailers have experienced great difficulty in securing shipments of goods owing to embargoes placed on certain districts by the railways. Shipments from the United States have been very slow in arriving, and there is a scarcity of many lines of goods. Travelers are making the best of trying situation created by the curtailment of the passenger train service. Travelers affected most are those working the smaller towns and cities. Business is seasonably good and the outlook for spring is very promising.

## AMATEURS AGAIN SCORE SUCCESS

"1917 Revue" Proves a Brilliant Entertainment  
Imperial Was Crowded

Music and Dancing, With Humor and Allusions to Local Matters, Aroused Enthusiasm of Big Audience

The well deserved reputation for the excellence of their entertainments, which has been won by local amateurs, was further enhanced by the "1917 Revue," which was staged in the Imperial Theatre last evening under the auspices of the Loyalist Chapter, I. O. D. E. The play for sympathy for amateur efforts, which was made in the prologue, was quite unnecessary; in practically every detail the entertainment attained a professional standard of excellence. The stage was set for each number, so as to form the most effective surroundings; the costumes were quite wonderful, and the work of each member of the large cast was such as to win unstinted applause and praise.

The keynote was set in the prologue given by Miss Kathleen Coster, who appeared from a gaily decorated box which was carried on the stage by Miss Lois Grimmer and Miss Muriel Sallie, costumed as footmen of stately appearance. Then came the opening number modestly described as "The world's worst watchmen," a gay Pierrot troupe, directed by W. C. Smith with M. E. Belling as musical director, and including Miss Valie Fenton, Miss Emeline Climo, Thomas Guy and Arch. Mason. The novelty of this feature made it one of the most attractive on the programme. Miss Kathleen Coster and Miss Dorothy Blizard gave a well executed presentation of the Military Stamp, a new dance step, their costumes added materially to the effect. The tableau, "Every girl is fishing," with solo by Miss Kathryn Gallivan, assisted by Fred. McGuire, as arranged by Mrs. A. C. Wilson, proved a very attractive feature. The tableau, "The death of Black Eagle," a tableau arranged by St. Monica's Society. Miss Louise Anderson's rich voice was heard to advantage in her selection from "Madame Butterfly." The "picture gallery," arranged by the French Club, was a noteworthy feature of the entertainment. Famous paintings were reproduced with great fidelity by Mrs. D. Mullin, Miss deSoyres, Miss Berly Mullin, Miss Doris Sayre, Miss Margaret Carvill and Mrs. Gregory. A scene arranged at the last moment, presenting "Leut. Stehlein in his French uniform, aroused tremendous enthusiasm. "Circus Day" was a merry frolic, complete with circus girls, Pierrettes, clowns and tumblers, carried out in true revue style. Miss Lillian Jones, Woodstock, who had trained the dancers, appeared in solo dances which won the most generous applause. Miss MacLaren and Miss McLean, in the roles of clowns, furnished much amusement. The fashion show, arranged by Miss Frances Kerr, was a feature which appealed strongly to the ladies but which the mere men also found well worth watching. In the "Dance of Ages," the various steps which have proved popularly what the latest ideas were well presented and a futuristic idea of what the dance may be in the next century rounded off the number. James Garrett, who was heard in a solo song, received hearty applause. The "Ebony Swells," which brought the audience to their feet, was a hilarious hit from the first and fun continued until the curtain dropped. F. C. MacNeill was most impressive in reciting part of this feature also was of a high order of merit. James Ford acted as musical director and to his careful training must be ascribed much of the credit for the success at Imperial.

## RECENT DEATHS
