ALLENBY PAYS HIGH TRIBUTE TO CANADA TROOPS

Hero of Palestine Says Solid Empire Can Prevent Another Great War

CONTROL OF SEAS Britain Shuns Desire To Own Oceans But They Must Be Unfettered

Canadian Press VICTORIA, B. C., March 8.—The world never will be by a great armed conflict like the late war again, if the British Empire stands together, Viscount Allenby, commander of the British armies which recovered the Holy Land for Christendom, declared in an address before the Canadian Club here.

TRIBUTE TO TROOPS The speaker paid a striking tribute to the Canadian troops in France. He told how he had been in command of troops near the Canadian corps before Vimy Ridge, and had taken part in the battles with the Canadians there under British command.

EMPIRE SOLIDARITY Today the Empire was more unified than ever in its history, Viscount Allenby assured his hearers. His travels in the last few months, he said, had convinced him of the Empire's increasing solidarity.

TELLS OF PALESTINE In an address delivered under the auspices of the National Council of Education, Viscount Allenby said that turning of the enemy's flank in Palestine was one of the most important victories in the great war, and paved the way for the allies' final overwhelming success. The campaign finished with the smothering of any chance of German influence becoming paramount in the near east, and left Britain with her avenues of communication intact.

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Nomination Four Weeks From Today

Four weeks from today will be nomination day for the civic election, with the voting taking place one week later. Should the proposed amendment to the civic election act, cutting out the primary election, be adopted, there will be only one voting at this election. Should this be withdrawn or not passed by the Legislature, the primary will be on the second Monday and the final on the fourth Monday. Nominations may be filed with the common clerk any time after March 15.

ATTEMPT TO MOVE ICE GORGE FAILS

Further Assault on 22-Mile Field to Be Made This Afternoon

Canadian Press OIL CITY, Pa., March 8.—Howard T. Barnes, Montreal scientist, who is attempting to weaken the 22 mile ice gorge in the Allegheny river here, with a chemical process, expected to renew his assault against the menace this afternoon. He made preparation to explode 12 additional containers of thermite at the southern end of the gorge.

TWO PLANES WAITED Left For Red Lake Mining Camp Friday and Have Not Returned

HUDSON, Ont., March 8.—Two planes which left Friday morning for the Red Lake Mining camp had not returned yesterday. 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FEELING RUNS HIGH AMONG GERMAN ENVOYS

German Delegates Centre of Demonstration After Conference

SEE LONG SESSION Teutons Hold Stand Against Enlarging Permanent Membership Now

Canadian Press GENEVA, March 8.—The assembly of the League of Nations, convened for the election of Germany to membership, is likely to find its life prolonged far beyond the brief period which it had been predicted would be required to elect the new member and install her in a permanent seat in the League Council, along with the other four permanent members—Great Britain, France, Japan, and Italy.

GERMANS HOOTED The situation is admitted by all parties, to be serious. Feeling ran so high last night that when Dr. Luther and Dr. Stresemann, respectively German Chancellor and Foreign Minister left the hotel where Sir Austen Chamberlain, British Foreign Secretary, is stopping, after a conference with the other League signatories, they were greeted by shouts from the crowd of "Long live Poland!" Only a quick dash into their limousines saved the Reich representatives from a more prolonged demonstration.

UNANIMITY NEEDED France and Great Britain pressed for an agreement to admit Spain, with a like request. Japan is declared to favor China's petition at least to the extent of a non-permanent seat. An endeavor to obtain from Germany the concession which would admit Spain to a permanent seat now and Poland to a non-permanent seat in the regular session of the assembly in September, was futile. Germany was inflexible in refusing to accept any obligations in advance as to what she would do when elected to the council.
