

MISSOURI TO OPEN \$4,500,000 CAPITOL

Large Number of Notables Expected at Dedication of Building.

Jefferson City, Mo., Oct. 7.—The largest crowd of distinguished American and native Missourians that has ever been seen at a public gathering in Missouri is expected to come here Oct. 6, to attend the formal dedication of the new Missouri state capitol building.

More than 1,000 participants will depict the history and growth of Missouri. Each epoch will be presided over by the wife of the governor who served during the period of the new building's construction.

The new capitol was built at a cost of approximately \$4,500,000 and was constructed of Southwest Missouri marble and limestone. It was erected to replace the structure destroyed by fire February 8, 1911. Actual work began May 6, 1913, and ended September 8, 1917. Since that time, however, much additional work has been done.

The building covers three acres, has 100,000 feet of floor space, is five stories high and contains 8,648,814 cubic feet.

FORM ORGANIZATION.

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I. O. D. E. CHAPTERS PLAN FOR WINTER

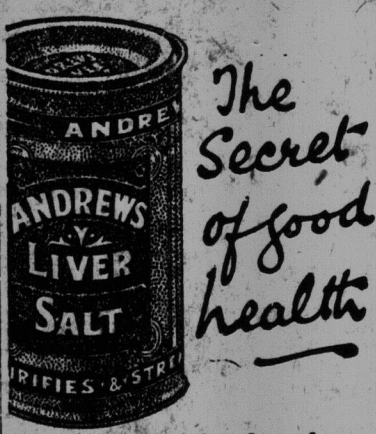

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DIRECTORS OF FERNHILL MEET

Winter Work—New Way to Mark Perpetual-Care Lots.

The Fernhill Cemetery Directors held their regular quarterly meeting yesterday afternoon, with the president, Colonel E. T. Sturdee, presiding, and a good representation of members present.

A new method of marking perpetual care lots so that they can be easily discerned was decided upon, and an expenditure authorized to provide the new sets of letter forms necessary for the concrete blocks.

Several new purchases were reported, including a horse-drawn lawn mower, an avenue sweeper, a motor truck, a hose reel, dump cart and others.

Several improvements had been made in the grounds during the summer, including the removal of some broken and unsightly iron railings on abandoned lots.

During the fall and winter the superintendent was requested to complete the new lots on Central avenue, to regrade the Marine lot, mix and apply fertilizer to various plots, make concrete markers for lots, haul gravel for use in foundation and do other works.

A report was submitted by the superintendent on various systems which he had investigated in other cemeteries on his recent vacation in the vicinity of Boston.

He found the perpetual care lots marked with a concrete mark of about 14 by 9 inches. The chapels and tombs are more elaborate and costly than those in Fernhill, but cannot give better service. The principal avenues are coated with asphaltic material which gives a richness to the place.
