

Jefferson City, Mo., Oct. 7—The largest crowd of distinguished American and native Missourians that has ever been seen at a public gathering in Mis-souri' is expected to come here Oct. 6, to attend the formal dedication of the new Missouri state capitol building. Governors of eight states at least will be present to make addresses, as well as four former governors of Mis-souri. Parades, speeches, band concerts, a gigantic bistorical pageant and a freworks display on the Missouri river will make up the programme. The main feature will be the pageant.




