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**SAYS EAST FARMER
CAN GET BRITONS**

Ottawa, Sept. 28.—The farmers of Ontario have an opportunity to obtain next year's farm help, according to A. R. Mitchell, field supervisor for the Soldiers' Settlement Board. Mr. Mitchell, in his travels around the country, has made a careful study of the farm labor situation. The railways, he says, have fortunately brought to this country about 11,000 harvesters to assist in harvesting the western grain crop. In a short time they will have completed this work and will be seeking other employment which will not be available in the prairie provinces.

Many of these men, says Mr. Mitchell, have had farming experience in the Old Country and among them there must be some good herdsmen and farm laborers. Dairy farmers in eastern Ontario, who usually carry a large herd through the winter, might do well to get some of these men. It was quite probable many of them would wish to remain in Canada rather than go back to the Old Country. They might be willing to stay in this country at small wages, says Mr. Mitchell, during the winter and be available for spring work and harvest. The Soldiers' Settlement Board will assist these farmers in obtaining their help.

The New Brunswick Historical Society, at its meeting last night, by unanimous vote recommended that an endeavor should be made to have Fort Howe made a national park and reaffirmed its former motion calling for greater consideration being given Maritime Province historical sites by the Historic Sites and Monuments Board. Rev. William Armstrong, the president, was in the chair and there was an unusually large attendance at the meeting.

There was general discussion of the proposal which Dr. Clarence Webster and brought from the Parks Commission at Ottawa that the idea of a park at Fort Howe should be abandoned and memorial slabs placed in Market square and on the sites of some of the forts.

PRIEST FEARS CONSEQUENCES IF DRY LAW IS NOT CHANGED
Chicago, Sept. 29.—Dire consequences will result unless the Volstead act is changed, the Rev. Francis C. Young, assistant pastor of St. Raphael's German Catholic Church, author of verses entitled "The March to Victory" and "Our Nation's Prayer," declared in a statement. It was at his church that the funeral of George ("Spot") Bucher, who was shot and killed with George Meaghan Sept. 17 by unidentified assailants, supposedly in a war between rival beer runners, was held.

"The Volstead act is a law. It is, however, one of the biggest farces in our country, and must be changed," said the assistant pastor. "The general disregard for the Volstead law is the cause of much of the present disrespect for all law.

"Why are bootleggers and beer-runners in such large numbers, if there is no demand for their stuff?"

"There is no doubt in my mind that the majority of the people want the Volstead law changed. This can be done. Let those who represent you understand that it must be modified if they care for your support in the future."

Until the law can be changed, he said, the authorities must enforce the law and the people must respect it.

500,000 Turkeys for Thanksgiving. Regina, Sept. 29.—Local dealers estimate that half a million turkeys will be available from Saskatchewan for Thanksgiving Day. They state that the price will certainly not be higher than last year when the best birds sold at 80c a pound.
