Advertising Men Here Confer on Matter of Writing Clubs.

The members of the St. John Advertising Club listened to an interesting address yesterday on the subject of advertising clubs in various cities of Canada and the possibility of forming a Canadian group, separate and distinct from the organization known as The Associated Advertising Clubs of the World. The address was really an informal talk by H. S. Van Scouyou, publicity manager of the Canada Cement Co., Ltd., acting president of the Canadian Advertising Clubs of the World, and president of the Montreal Advertising Club.

There was some discussion and Mr. Van Scouyou was asked questions by various members concerning the advisability of forming a Canadian group. The opinion was expressed that nothing definite along this line should be done until after the London convention. A vote of thanks was moved by F. W. Daniel and tendered to the speaker by the president, Stanley Emerson. Mr. Van Scouyou, who was in the city attending the convention of the Engineering Institute, left on the afternoon train for Montreal.

WANT FORT HOWE TO BE MADE PARK

The New Brunswick Historical Society, at its meeting last night, by unanimous vote recommended that an endeavor should be made to have Fort Howe made a national park and reaffirmed its former motion calling for greater consideration being given Maritime Province historical sites by the Historic Sites and Monuments Board. Rev. William Armstrong, the president, was in the chair and there was an unusually large attendance at the meeting.

There was general discussion of the proposal which Dr. Clarence Webster had brought from the Parks Commission at Ottawa that the idea of a park at Fort Howe should be abandoned and memorial slabs placed in Market square and on the sites of some of the forts.

The W. M. S. of St. David's Church held their annual birthday social last evening. The guests were received by Mrs. P. C. Johnston and Mrs. Hugh Miller. The programme included a piano duet by Mrs. J. A case against the Royal Hotel, charged with allowing moose out of season on the menu, was put off for one week yesterday, and will then be postponed until October 8. W. M. Ryan is appearing for the prosecution and E. J. Henneberry for the defence.

SAYS EAST FARMER CAN GET BRITONS

Ottawa, Sept. 28.—The farmers of Ontario have an opportunity to obtain next year's farm help, according to A. R. Mitchell, field supervisor for the Soldiers' Settlement Board. Mr. Mitchell, in his travels around the country, has made a careful study of the farm labor situation. The railways, he says, have fortunately brought to this country about 11,000 harvesters to assist in harvesting the western grain crop. In a short time they will have completed this work and will be seeking other employment which will not be available in the prairie provinces.

Many of these men, says Mr. Mitchell, have had farming experience in the Old Country and among them there must be some good herdsmen and farm laborers. Dairy farmers in eastern Ontario, who usually carry a large herd through the winter, might do well to get some of these men. It was quite probable many of them would wish to remain in Canada rather than go back to the Old Country. They might be willing to stay in this country at small wages, says Mr. Mitchell, during the winter and be available for spring work and harvest. The Soldiers' Settlement Board will assist these farmers in obtaining this help.

MACK'S HELPMATE NO. 4 LAUDS NOS. 1 AND 2

New York, Sept. 28.—A spotlight on theatrical domesticity—particularly Willard Mack's domesticity—has come to light. A couple of weeks ago when Thomas Wilkes, San Francisco and Los Angeles producer, offered George Middleton's new play, "The Road to Nowhere," with Marjorie Rambeau as the star, he informed her that he had engaged Maude Leone, who was Wife No. 1 in the Willard-Mack Series, for a principal role. Miss Rambeau, who was Wife No. 2, offered no objection, and the two ex-wives of the playwright actor appeared together.

Now Wilkes, who has just reached New York, reports that the biggest event of the opening night at Los Angeles was when Mack took wife No. 4 backstage to compliment his two acting helpmates on their performances.

PRIEST FEARS CONSEQUENCES IF DRY LAW IS NOT CHANGED

Chicago, Sept. 28.—Dire consequences
will result unless the Volstead act is
changed, the Rev. Francis C. Young,
assistant pastor of St. Raphael's Ger-
man Catholic Church, author of verses
entitled "The March to Victory" and
"Our Nation's Prayer," declared in a
statement. It was at his church that
the funeral of George ("Spot") Bucher,
who was shot and killed with George
McGowan Sept. 17 by unidentified as-
sailants, supposedly in a war between
rival beer runners, was held.
"The Volstead act is a law. It is,
however, one of the biggest farces in

said, the authorities must enforce the
