SPORT NEWS GLEANED FROM WORLD'S CENTRES

JIMMY FRUZZETTI AWARDED DECISION

Outpointed "Irish Kid" Williams in Ten Rounds—Preliminaries.

Jimmy Fruzetti of Boston was awarded a decision over "Irish Kid" Williams of New York in a ten-round bout staged in the Armory last evening. The Boston boy did most of the leading and landed more frequently than his opponent and the decision was favorably received by the fans present.

From the first tap of the gong until the bout ended, Fruzetti showed a willingness to mix and continuously led, while his opponent displayed marked skill at blocking and ring generalship, but somewhat marred his showing by his tendency to run into clinches.

Joe O'Connor was the referee for the three bouts, while James Pullen and Joe Daley were timers. There were no judges. The rules of the preliminary events were that the boxers were to break clean from a clinch and no fighting was to be allowed, but in the bout between Gordon Paris and Jim Kendrick, Paris failed on several occasions to adhere to the rule and had to be warned.

This bout went eight two minute rounds to a draw, although the majority of the audience thought that Paris should have been given the decision. It was not until the finish of the bout that it was reported that Kendrick had badly damaged the right hand in the second round.

Bobby Mason and Young Al Stockley went two minute rounds to a draw, and the boxers showed considerable energy but lacked experience in the ring.

Lively While It Lasted.

The bout between Machine Gun Smith, of St. John, and a lanky colored man called Mike Honeyman, of England, was rather lively while it lasted, and the men swapped some good stiff punches during the rounds. The bout, however, came to a close near the end of the third round when Smith, poked a hard right, swing to Honeyman's jaw and he sank to the floor, rested on his right side looking at Smith and the referee, while the latter awarded the bout to Smith on a technical knockout. As soon as the decision was given, Honeyman regained his feet and objected, not knowing that the rules called for no counting in the preliminaries.

The Main Bout.

The final bout, ten three-minute rounds, was between Jimmy Fruzetti, the Boston lightweight, and Irish Kid Williams, of New York, and while it went the limit, and the two men boxed fast at times, there was nothing at any stage that went to show that either was in great difficulty during any round of the "go." Williams showed ability, but the Boston fighter had the edge in points. Some of the punches exchanged were rather stiff, but it was the kind that makes a fighter weak. Williams went into a clinch frequently, and while there was some bringing and exchanging between the men, both were about as strong at the finish of the final round almost as they were at the start. When the decision was given to Fruzetti it was favorably received by the audience.

Fight by Rounds.

Round one—Williams led with left to face and the men clinched. Fruzetti exchanged rights and Williams slipped to the floor on regaining his feet. The boxers exchanged light blows and again went into a clinch. Fruzetti missed a wicked right uppercut and then placed his left on the Kid's face. Williams landed left to chin and the men clinched. The boxing was fast with frequent exchanges and the round finished without any real damage having been done.

Round two—After sparring, the men exchanged a few light rights and lefts and went into a clinch, and on the breakaway Fruzetti landed a stiff right to the jaw and right to the body, when Williams clinched. The boxing was fast with frequent exchanges and the round finished without any real damage having been done.

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Round four—The boxers closed and exchanged some short light body blows with their hands. Fruzetti hooked his left to chin and Williams followed with a light right to mouth. There was a brief exchange and then another clinch. Williams landed right to face and clinched. Fruzetti upset with his left to chin and the men went into action at close quarters without damage in the exchange. The men were sparring at the close of the round.

Round five—After some sparring Williams placed his right to face and received a stiff left to jaw in return and the men clinched. Fruzetti hooked stomach in return and received a left to face in return on a breakaway from a clinch. The Kid landed another right to head and missed a swing just as Fruzetti landed right to head and ducked clear of a couple of nasty right and left swings from Williams. The men were clinched and the round finished without any real damage having been done.

Round six—Williams danced about the ring at the opening and went into a clinch when Fruzetti placed a right swing to the head. Williams landed a left hook to jaw and received a lively exchange without any damage and the men clinched. Fruzetti placed two right uppercuts to stomach and Williams landed a right to the side of the face and received a stiff right in return. They were sparring at the sound of the gong.

Round seven—Fruzetti started the round with a left to the chin and did not get a return. He missed a right swing to the head and then went into a clinch. Fruzetti had the Kid dancing around the ring and finally landed a right to the stomach. After sparring he placed a stiff left to the chin and received a right to the side of the head in return. After some sparring Williams landed left swing to the side of the head and right to the head. The men were clinched and exchanging light body blows when the round finished.

Round eight—After some sparring, the men went into a clinch. On breaking away Fruzetti placed right to body and left to side of face, and in return Williams landed a right to face. The men were clinched and exchanging light body blows when the round finished.

Round nine—After the men broke from a clinch, Fruzetti placed a light hook on the Kid's jaw and they went into another clinch and exchanged light body blows. On the breakaway, Williams swung right to body and in return got a stiff right punch to the stomach. The Boston boxer followed with left to face and right to body and the men clinched, exchanging rights and lefts to body before they broke clear. Fruzetti swung right to body of the game Malcolm and Ugrahart scored in monotonous regularity.

Round ten—Fruzetti started the round on the jump and managed to land right and left swings to head, causing Williams to cover up and go into a clinch. On the breakaway Fruzetti followed with a stiff right to jaw and right to body, when Williams clinched. Fruzetti was doing most of the leading and frequently landing without return. Williams swung right to face and after a clinch hooked a left to head. The Boston boy then had the Kid dancing round the ring and finally landed a stiff right to the body and left to face, and on going into a clinch Williams landed an uppercut to stomach. Fruzetti kept right after his man at every opportunity and with swings to head and body caused the Kid to clinch. The men were locked together at the conclusion of the round.

Referee O'Connor awarded the decision to Fruzetti, which was received with considerable applause.

During the programme, Stoker Callahan of England issued a challenge to any lightweight in the city, Al Palmer preferred. It was announced that Al Hogan had accepted the challenge, and the bout will take place at a future date.

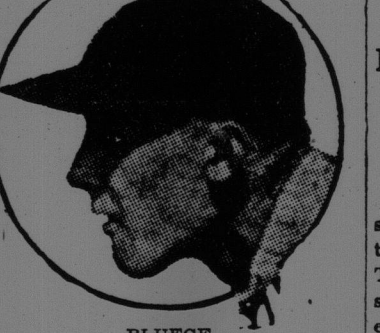

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WORLD RECORDS MAY BE BROKEN

Big Things Expected at First International Indoor Championships

Canada's first International indoor skating championship meet, which is to be held in the Arena next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, should be one of the greatest skating events ever held in the Dominion. The entries show 128 contestants ready to face the starter in the various events, and this list includes the cream of the speed skaters of the continent.

It is expected that skating history will be made and that former records will be shattered when Charlie Gorman, Joe Moore, Kasky, Steinmetz, Donovan and other leading performers will clash in their struggle for premier honors.

Records Old Ones.

In previous years the indoor international did not follow so soon after the big outdoor meets and as a result the skaters were more or less scattered and not so many of the headlines under the blue sky were available for the indoor events. This is not the case this year, however, and it is expected that the best performers in the country that many look for some of the indoor records to go by the board.

Indoor and Outdoor Records.

In several cases the indoor records are faster than the outdoor. The fastest mark in the indoor 220 was made by Fred Robson, of Toronto, in 1911. It was 18 seconds. The nearest approach to this mark made outdoors has been that of Charles Jewtraw, who hung up a figure of 18.4 seconds at the outdoor international meet in St. John last year.

In 1913 Bobby McLean set an indoor mark of 37.5 seconds for the 440 yards. Last week Gorman, who had already bettered this mark, hung up 36.5 seconds for the quarter, a faster performance than McLean's. Will Gorman, world champion quarter miler, smash McLean's indoor record at the Arena.

For Half Mile, Too.

McLean also holds the indoor record for the half mile, having negotiated the 880 in 11 minutes 16.1 seconds. The outdoor record made last year by Joe Moore is a bit slower, 1 minute 16.5 seconds.

The Three Miles.

The smoky city of Pittsburgh was also the scene of Charles T. Fisher's performance when, in 1916, he traveled three miles in 9 min. 33.5 sec., the indoor record. Joe Moore claims a record of 8 min. 21.5 sec. for the three mile outdoor event, made last year. But Joe's claim still awaits official approval. It is contended that a wrong count was made in the number of laps around the track, and that the record should be 8 min. 21.5 sec. plus a few seconds. However, that will be settled later. Previous to that the three mile outdoor mark was around 9 min. 45 sec. as held by Roy McWhirter, of Chicago.

Some Good Ones.

Looking over the previous figures and remembering the galaxy of skaters who are coming here, one is led to believe that it would not be at all surprising if some of records do not go by the board.

Some of the star indoor skaters are Forssman, of the Icelandic team, of New York, who is also the 1924 holder of the Middle Atlantic outdoor title and winner of the Silver Skates Derby; Eddie Meyer, winner of the Don Donhue Memorial three mile race in New York this year, and Leslie Boyd and Allan Potts, who is running close to the mark in the view of the fact that he has been skating on the big indoor rinks of New York and are likely to be pretty smooth navigators.

To Act as Officials.

Word has been received by the committee in charge of the sports that W. J. Nicholson, of Pittsburgh, will be here for the meet. He will be referee. Other visitors who will act as officials are Charles T. Fisher, of the Canadian Amateur Skating Association, Montreal; Alderman Louis Rubenstein, president of the C. A. S. A., of Montreal; and William Taylor, trainer of the United States Olympic Skating team. The popular J. A. Taylor, honorary president of the C. A. S. A., also of Montreal, is expected for the latter part of the meet.

COHEN OF REDS ASKS COURT TO CHANGE NAME TO BOHNE

San Francisco, Feb. 23—Sammy Bohné, Cincinnati Reds' second baseman, who began his baseball career on San Francisco's sandlots when he was Sammy Cohen, wants the name of Bohné conferred upon him by legal edict. An application was filed in Superior Court here recently requesting permission for the change in name. Sammy's mail is going away because "Sammy Cohen," the name some of his old friends use in addressing him, is unknown around baseball headquarters, the petition states. Cohen changed his name to Bohné when he began playing in the Pacific Coast League.
