FERTILIZERS HELP
CONTROL INSECT PESTS.

Anything which will give the plant best growing conditions—a well prepared seed bed, properly fertilized, good seed and a suitable rotation, will enable it to survive a greater amount of unfavorable weather, to be sown reasonably late and yet survive more or less an amount of infestation which would damage or even destroy a crop less well handled. A fertilizer which will hasten maturity is recommended for all southern Indiana soils and the use of lime on most farms is also much needed. Since the growth and vigor of a plant are directly related to Hessian fly, jointworm and wheat-midge injuries, it is important that the soil be not only properly manured but it should be so handled as to give a good seed bed and where the ground is to be plowed, this can best be done by plowing before the middle of August and subsequently harrowing as is necessary. Later plowing, even when thoroughly packed is never as satisfactory as earlier plowing and subsequent harrowing.


