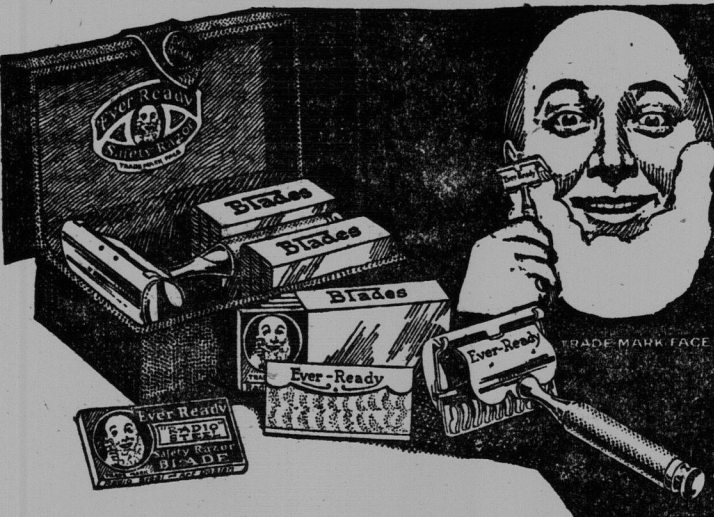

FERTILIZERS HELP CONTROL INSECT PESTS.

Anything which will give the plant best growing conditions—a well prepared seed bed, properly fertilized, good seed and a suitable rotation, will enable it to give a greater amount of unfavorable weather, to be sown reasonably late and yet survive more or less severe winters, and above all to overcome an amount of infestation which would damage or even destroy a crop less well handled. A fertilizer which will hasten maturity is also much needed. Since the growth and vigor of a plant are directly related to Hessian fly, joint-worms, and other insect injuries, it is important that the soil be not only properly manured but it should be so handled as to give a good seed bed and where the ground is to be plowed, this can best be done by plowing before the middle of August and subsequently harrowing as is necessary. CROPS IN DANGER FROM BUSH FIRES

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
Winnipeg, Aug. 9.—Crops and farm buildings north of Balmoral, about thirty-five miles from this city are endangered by a bush fire which today assumed alarming proportions. All cutting has been stopped and a combined attempt is being made by every available man in the district to check the progress of the fire, which is fanned by a twenty-five mile an hour breeze. Staked hay, estimated at 800 tons, has already been destroyed.

A STUDY IN PRICES.

Anchorage, Alaska, Aug. 10.—Veteran "sourdoughs" who used to pay \$2.50 a plate for pork and beans without a murmur and to whom ham and eggs were as sure-enough luxury, take keen comfort in the buffet car recently placed on one of the trains operating between Seward and Anchorage. Tourists who have dined on Uncle Sam's rolling kitchen talk about the menu for a long time thereafter. For an elaborate dinner of fresh mountain trout with a rash of bacon the modest sum of \$1.25 is asked. Baked or fried Matanuska potatoes are sold for fifteen cents an potato, grape fruit, oranges and other fresh fruits are served for twenty-five cents and coffee costs ten cents a cup. Meats are naturally a trifle higher than they are on the "outside" on account of the high cost of transportation but, Alaska railroad officials believe, it will soon be possible to obtain home grown meat in abundance.
