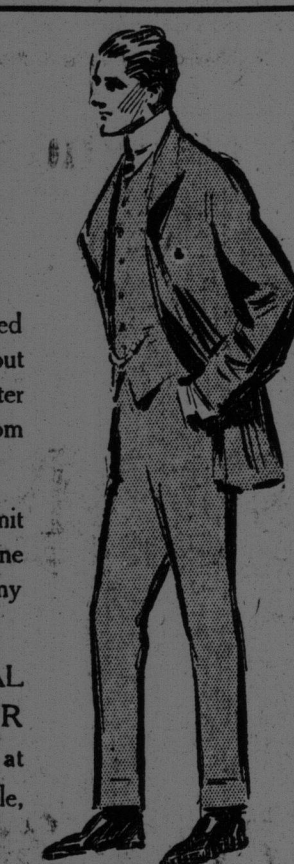

## GREEK FIRED ON BY TURKISH CRUISER; CAPTAIN SINKS HER

Athens, Jan. 16.—The Turkish cruiser Medjidie sailed out of the Dardanelles in a fog on Tuesday night, and off Syria yesterday, attacked and sank the Greek merchantman Macedonia, which had been armed by the Greek government as a transport. The Medjidie then sailed to the eastward. The Greek fleet has been warned to intercept her.

The Medjidie was built by the Crans of Philadelphia. She bombarded the Macedonia at Syria without effect, but practically wrecked the electric plant and as a result the town is in darkness. Two men working at the electric plant were killed. The Macedonia was being run by the harbor when the Turkish warship appeared and fired fifteen rounds at her. The commander of the Macedonia ordered his ship flooded and after disembarking the crew, sent her to the bottom to save her from destruction.

The Medjidie did not attack the town, but the people are panic stricken.

Constantinople, Jan. 16.—The Porte has instructed the Turkish plenipotentiaries to remain in London until the ambassadors of the powers have presented their note. The date for the presentation is still uncertain. The German ambassador is awaiting instructions.

London, Jan. 16.—A Lloyd's despatch from Sulina, Roumania, reports that orders have been issued to prepare for mobilization.

MOTION PICTURE

HOUSES ON SUNDAY

Winnipeg, Jan. 16.—A movement has been inaugurated here with the object of opening of motion picture theatres here and in other Canadian cities on Sundays for the presentation of select films.

Commencing next Monday and continuing for four weeks, patrons of local picture theatres will have the privilege of voting on the proposal.

WINNIPEG'S IMPORTS

Winnipeg, Man., Jan. 16.—The report of the provincial department of agriculture just issued, shows, among other things, that Winnipeg alone in the fiscal year ended November 30, 1912, imported milk and sweet cream from the United States to the value of \$102,000, and that \$170,000 pounds of butter were imported into the city chiefly from the eastern provinces, but some from New Zealand. The total grain crop of the province for 1912 was 182,377,494 bushels, being 22,000,000 bushels more than the preceding year.

## SENDS UP THE VALUE OF LAND IN DOMINION

English Holders of Canadian Property Pleased Over Move By C. P. R.

SAV PRICES WILL INCREASE

Decision of the Railway to Withdraw Its Holdings From Area of Speculation and Sell Only to Bona Fide Settlers

(Times Special Correspondence.)

London, Jan. 16.—An immediate increase in the price of Canadian land generally will be the result of the decision of the C. P. R. to withdraw its land from the area of speculation and to sell it only to bona fide settlers.

The announcement has created a sensation in London. Perhaps not fully realized how great an effect this step will exercise on the Canadian land question. It is regarded here as the "unsuspected increment." The withdrawal of seven million acres makes a big hole in the lands which are available to speculators, and those who possess options on large parcels of land are counting themselves fortunate today.

Canadian real estate men in London are overjoyed at the decision. It has, they say, automatically increased the value of their holdings. Hitherto extremely anxious for sales, they are now quite backward in this direction, and are waiting for the rise which they are convinced is bound to come.

In another way the Canadian Pacific move will exert a tremendous influence. It will say those who are competent to judge, be of great value in drawing to Canada those tenant farmers who were looking to other parts of the empire. It has long been evident that Australia's rapidly increasing grasp on this class of settlers was based on the fact that the government of the dominion held out more tangible advantages than did that of the dominion. One hundred and sixty acres free was a great magnet some years ago when there was practically no competition, but its attraction has very sensibly decreased, since Australia invaded the emigration field with its attractive offers of lands to be paid for over a series of years.

The lack of development of Northern Ontario, may, in a great measure be traced to the fact that successful settlement in that area calls for more enterprise of a certain kind than is to be normally found in farmers in those islands. Great Britain in the past contributed many excellent pioneers to the dominion, so many indeed, that it may be safely hazarded that the breed is diminishing.

Another factor which should not escape attention is that British farmers, who in purchasing farms in Canada will not now be called on to put up all the purchase price, will thereby be enabled to take their farm help with them to the dominion. One of the most potent causes which have operated to prevent tenant farmers from going to Canada, has been the widely spread statement as to the lack of farm workers there. The very nature of the work of emigration officers demands that they emphasize this point; and the stories which reach this side every year, indicating that crops cannot be harvested because of lack of labor, has had a decided tendency to make farmers chary of embarking to a country where such conditions are operative.

The decision is bound to give a decided fillip to emigration to Canada this year. It comes just at the right moment.
