CONGRATULATIONS

Congratulations are heartily extended to Hon. William Pugsley, who today is 63 years of age and is in the enjoyment of excellent health. Although for the time being he is a member of His Majesty's loyal opposition, and does not loom large in the political news of the day, Dr. Pugsley is nevertheless a national figure. At no time in his very successful career has he been regarded with greater interest, or commanded the admiration of his supporters and the respect of his opponents in so large measure as today.

A St. John paper of July 1st, 1871, which a friend the other day laid on the desk of the Times, contains an advertisement dated June 26th of that year, announcing that Mr. William Pugsley, junior, had just been associated with the law firm of Crawford & Pugsley, of which the other members were Mr. J. Herbert Crawford and Mr. Gilbert R. Pugsley. In these 42 years, Mr. William Pugsley has not only attained eminence at the bar, but in the public life of New Brunswick and the Dominion.

The people of St. John have a special reason for congratulating Dr. Pugsley upon his continued good health, and in expressing the hope that he will soon again occupy a position in which he will be able to carry forward the great projects affecting trade and transportation at the port of St. John, which he inaugurated while a member of the Liberal government at Ottawa. The citizens have had an opportunity in the last two years to observe some contrasts, and to realize how much they need the forceful energy of such a representative as Dr. Pugsley in the cabinet at Ottawa.

It will be remembered that, when the Laurier government was defeated, boasts were made by the Conservative press that the department over which Dr. Pugsley presided would be investigated, and he would be convicted of all sorts of political crimes and misdemeanors. The investigation may be sure was made, but not one solitary charge of any sort has been laid at the door of the late minister of public works. His record as the head of that department has been clean, and those who sought political capital to be used against him were utterly confounded.

During the last session of parliament the country was made aware in such a manner as had not before been illustrated of the splendid fighting qualities of Dr. Pugsley. The triumph of the Liberals in the fiercest battle of the session was Dr. Pugsley's triumph, and proved him to be not only courageous and resourceful, but the most alert and skillful parliamentarian on the floor of the house.

Dr. Pugsley has rendered his country splendid service, as one of her ablest public men, and there can be no reasonable doubt that he will render still greater service in the years to come. He has done more to place St. John on the map as a national port than any other representative of the city has ever had in parliament.

THE ROGERS METHOD

Hon. Robt. Rogers, in one of his recent speeches in the province of Saskatchewan, made a savage attack upon the Liberal government of that province, and practically intimated that the way for the province to get from the Borden government control of its natural resources would be to place a royal government in charge of provincial affairs. He charged the existing Saskatchewan government with most of the crimes in the political calendar. The Winnipeg Tribune makes some comments which ought to be of special interest to Mr. Rogers. It says that in the lack of responsible government and of British justice, Saskatchewan is entirely outclassed by the province represented by Mr. Rogers and his pal in politics, Sir Rodmond Roblin. To prove its case, the Tribune reviews the Macdonald by-election inquiry. Another journal, commenting on the remarks of Mr. Rogers, adds the by-elections in Richelieu and Antigonish to that in Macdonald as evidence that it is the Tories who have the most shameful record, and who have "outraged the public sense of decency and fair play." Mr. Borden, when in opposition, made very solemn professions of his determination to purify elections in Canada. Instead of doing so, he has profited politically by the methods of Boss Rogers.

SELLING BONDS LOCALLY

There has been some talk in St. John about offering city bonds to local investors in small parcels rather than place them upon the outside market. The town of Stratford, Ontario, recently adopted this plan, offering 5% per cent debentures at ten, twenty and thirty years, and it is said that \$86,000 worth have been taken up, the bonds being issued in sums of \$500 and \$1,000. The Ottawa Journal finds in this method of civic finance a hope for the future of civic administration, inasmuch as people who have made an investment in city bonds would naturally be more interested in good city government. It says:

"As the bonds of a municipality come to be held more or less largely by the

citizens of that city the effect should be a noticeable decrease in that apathy towards civic matters on the part of citizens so often deplored. As a shareholder in a business concern is more deeply concerned as a rule in its condition than one who has no direct concern, so the citizen who has an investment in the bonds of his home city will probably be a more active citizen than ever before. In time, the different cities may enter upon a healthy rivalry in this matter of taking up municipal issues of bonds locally."

Of course every tax-payer is a shareholder in the business of the city, and ought to be interested in getting full value for his investment, but experience has shown that the average citizen merely regards his taxes as so much money which must be thrown away, or diverted for purposes beneficial to him or his family. If he viewed the matter in the right light, he would see that every cent legitimately expended to better the conditions of life in the city is of direct benefit to all the tax-payers, and that it is therefore to their own advantage that they should all take a deep interest in civic affairs, and in having them conducted by men of ability, energy and devotion to the public service. Naturally the man who in addition to being a large tax-payer, is a bondholder, should have a still greater interest in promoting a wise administration of the city's affairs.

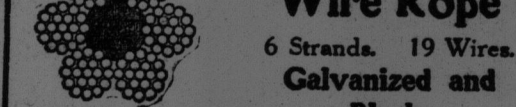

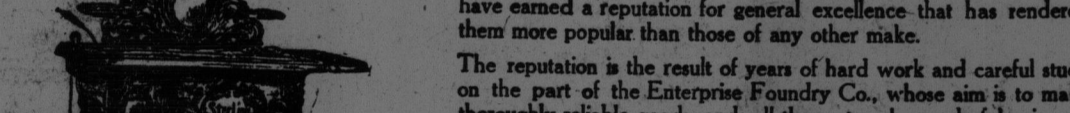

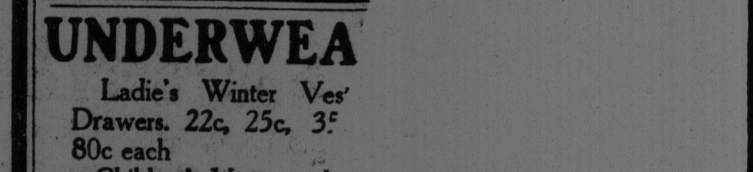
