Blissville, N. B., June 5—(Special)—The light rain fall and consequent low water have effectively handicapped the driving operations on the Oromocto. All hope of getting out the remainder of the cut for the summer's work is now shattered.

The Oromocto Lumber Company's drive on the North Branch, for the sawing of which the erection of a special mill was planned, has been abandoned. The Kirkpatrick drive, which is under the control of this company, has been hung up on the South Branch.

Luther B. Smith has been more successful. A drive of three million feet, belonging in part to Mr. Smith, has been driven from the South Oromocto lake to safety waters. Owing to the engagement of a large crew of seventy or eighty men, this space was covered in seven days. Another drive under the same management on the Back Creek has been abandoned, but will probably come with the autumn rains.


