MR. HARRISON'S PLAN

W. H. Harrison, M. L. A., who opened the discussion, said he was interested in some regulation that would allow the selling of what he termed the milk to meet the opposition to pasteurized milk and at a smaller price than the certified milk now being sold at quite high rates.

He said the British Board of Health allowed several grades of milk under the strictly control of the government. 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MAX ARRANGE FOR RAW MILK

Health Board Appoints Committee After Pasteurization Discussion

Talk Over Regulations Brings Out Much of Interest on Household Question

The net result of a lengthy conference on the milk situation held yesterday afternoon in the rooms of the Saint John Sub-District Board of Health, attended by members of the board, Premier J. B. M. Baxter, Hon. P. D. Tilley, James Lewis, M.L.A., W. H. Harrison, M.L.A., Dr. Henry J. Wilby, Minister of Health, and Chief Health Officer G. G. Melvin was the selection of a committee to meet and consider a halfway measure for the selling of raw milk to meet a demand for the same which the Government delegation contended existed in this community.

NEW GRADE OF MILK. This committee, named jointly by Premier Baxter and Chairman John Kelly, of the Board of Health, consists of Hon. P. D. Tilley, E. P. Raymond, Mr. R. J. Hooper, Commissioner R. W. Wigmore and Dr. William Warwick. They are to devise some regulations which will permit the sale of a grade of protected milk not as expensive as the so-called certified milk and yet unpasteurized. In the round-table discussion it was pointed out by the Government representatives that they would urge the sale of this milk of the names and addresses of each specified in cities, towns and counties, also addresses of all district health officers, whose duty it will be to see that all in their districts are registered.

A number of reports were received of an inferior class of work being done in some communities; also regarding plumbers coming into the province from outside and doing certain jobs in this province and leaving without obtaining certificates. In the future these will be dealt with under the act it was said.

Reports were also received from all health officers in the province. Preparations were made for the holding of examinations later at No. 12 Coburg street. Applications have been received from several centres.

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PUT OUT BRUSH FIRE

An alarm was sent in from Box 126 yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock on account of a brush fire off Douglas avenue facing Marble Cove. The firemen managed to beat the fire out without using water.

CHIEF HEALTH OFFICER

Dr. G. G. Melvin, chief provincial health officer, said that vaccination was legalized to prevent smallpox. Some were not willing to be vaccinated, but were quite willing to assume the risk of disease. Should be general public submit to this risk in countries where tests had been made, vaccination was obligatory as a preventive. It had been said during the discussion that Adam and Eve used the same kind of milk being used today in its raw state. That might be true enough, but under pasteurization from 300 to 400 lives had been saved by the pasteurizing of this food element in New Brunswick. It was not of question of cost, of added labor or of licenses, but of human lives. Tuberculosis, scarlet fever, diphtheria and other diseases were disseminated by milk, even certified milk. The infantile death rate was now vastly lower, and it was the duty of health bodies and health legislation to bring about this lowering of mortality statistics. Regulation could not prevent all from drinking milk, but it could greatly lessen the number of deaths. Pasteurization might seem an arbitrary regulation to some, and it was, but the same might be said of vaccination and certain regulations protective of public health. Dr. Melvin said he was persuaded many Saint John people were greatly in favor of pasteurization. The chief medical officer said that as vaccination was opposed to pasteurization, as he feared it would bring about laxity in the conditioning of cattle herds, but it had turned out that such is not the case.

15,000 QUARTS DAILY

In answer to Commissioner Wigmore's query as to the amount of pasteurized milk sold in Saint John daily, he was told it was in the vicinity of 15,000 quarts. The certified milk consumption was about 100 quarts. Dr. Curran said the members of the Government delegation were now exactly in the same position he found himself to be in three years ago when pasteurized milk was introduced. As the country representative he felt he was a servant of the general public and he and the people the advantages of the new regulation. If there was to be a relaxing of this stricture upon milk, a scheme might be worked in which Kings County milk (a day's drive in reaching this city) might be pasteurized and the fresher suburban milk of Saint John sold raw.

CANNOT GUARANTEE

Dr. Curran said that the public was assuming the health risk at the present time in buying unpasteurized milk of which only about 100 quarts a day were disposed of within the city limits. It would be idle of any such thing as a guarantee of purity in raw milk.

Hon. Mr. Tilley argued that country people and folks living in the other parts of the province were doing without pasteurized milk and that Saint John people in their suburban homes were being similarly served. This latter assertion however was challenged by Commissioner Wigmore and others who said that scores of families imported pasteurized milk into their country homes in summertime by choice.

SAYS BACKWARD STEP

Dr. H. L. Abramson, provincial bacteriologist, asserted it would be a long step backward if the status of pasteurized milk were impaired in this metropolitan community of the province. Pasteurization was the only method to germ life in milk, a faithful carrier of disease in the raw state. Tests of herds did not protect milk with any certainty, but pasteurization did. He was sorry to hear other cities quoted against the idea of pasteurization for the reason that it was a backward step. He said that in the discussion as to allowing several grades of milk, was notoriously behind the times in modern health measures.

MR. TILLEY'S IDEA

Hon. Mr. Tilley said he had no special argument against pasteurization. He was merely a member of the Government delegation to help devise some plan to meet the demand of those who desired raw milk. He concurred in the suggestion of a register of customers and dealers for this special privilege, also list of the herds supplying the milk. Any infraction of regulations having to do with the cleanliness of herds or the health of the cattle should be a loss of license to the dealer.

W. H. Golding asked if it was reasonable to expect various grades of safety from bacteriologists. He said certified, semi-certified and so on down the scale. Were there not sediment tests and records of bacterial counts on file at the present time that should give light upon this matter. And would the public be free from a recurrence of this milk undeniably if the pasteurization bars were lifted?
