Iron shipbuilders appear to be readily becoming an important branch of industry in Denmark. Although for the last fifteen years small iron vessels, designed for trading between the various Baltic ports, have been built at Copenhagen, it is only recently that the construction of large steamers has been attempted. At present several of one thousand tons are building, and one of these, it is stated, will be employed in laying down the telegraph cable between China and Japan. Two steamers, each of nearly nine hundred tons—the "Rolle" and the "Thorvaldsen"—lately made the passage to New York, and these are said to be the first iron vessels built in Denmark which have ever entered that port.
