### TAKEN BY THE JAPS

**Important Positions Around Port Arthur Occupied.**  
**CORNERING GEN. KUROPATKIN**

Hard Fighting at Port Arthur—Engagements Reported Going on Near Haicheng—Five Jap Officers Killed and 41 Wounded at Port Arthur—The Vladivostok Squadron Gets Away Again.

The Japs, Aug. 1.—A Japanese merchant has received word from a Chinese whom he trusts to the effect that the Japanese have occupied every position surrounding the besieged fortress of Port Arthur. The Chinese report that both sides suffered tremendous losses in the operations necessary to bring about this state of affairs. The members of the Russian Intelligence Bureau here, while denying the report that Port Arthur has been captured, are inclined to believe that the reports are true to the extent that the Japanese have made great progress about the operations of the besieged fortress.

**Tokio, Aug. 1.**—The rumored fall of Port Arthur is officially pronounced to be untrue.

**Site of the Fortress.**  
Tokio, Aug. 1.—The General Staff announced Saturday evening that five Japanese officers had been killed and forty-one wounded in the fighting which has been going on around Port Arthur since last Tuesday. This is the first announcement of its kind since the beginning of the siege of the fortress, and it indicates that there has been serious fighting.

**St. Petersburg, Aug. 1.**—Although public attention has been distracted from the events of the war during the past week, first, because of the fear of international complications, and second, because of the assassination of Minister of the Interior Von Plehve, the situation at the front is regarded as critical.

**London, Aug. 1.**—A telegram received from Haicheng says the Japanese attacked the Russian southern army on Friday morning. The Japanese advance is reported to be along the railway in the face of heavy artillery fire. The Japanese continued to advance until 11 o'clock, when at last they were checked. Later in the day the fighting was vigorously renewed.

**London, Aug. 1.**—The correspondent of The Daily Mail at New-Delhi says that there has been heavy fighting for two days in the marches south of Haicheng, during the gradual retreat from Tachekien of 5,000 Russian infantry and their guns, and that the peril of this force is increasing daily.

**Frankfurt, Germany, Aug. 1.**—The Telegram says that the Vladivostok squadron has returned to Vladivostok.

**St. Petersburg, Aug. 1.**—No details have been received here of the sinking of the British steamer Knight Commander by the Vladivostok squadron, except the statement to the effect that a portion of the crew and passengers and the ship's papers are held for production as evidence in court to justify the claim that the ship was a legal prize, and therefore subject to capture.

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### BURIAL OF VON PLEHVE.

**Attended by the Emperor and the Dowager Empress—Car Was Viciously Moved—Murderer in Prison.**

St. Petersburg, Aug. 1.—M. Von Plehve, late Minister of the Interior, was buried yesterday, and in every city and hamlet of this vast Empire church bells were rung and masses and prayers said for the repose of the soul of the murdered Minister. The services were of an impressive and imposing character. At 1 o'clock yesterday morning high mass was said in the stately chapel adjoining the Ministry of the Interior. Emperor Nicholas and the Dowager Empress stood with the widow and children of the Minister at the foot of a great mound of flowers, on which rested the casket.

The Emperor was visibly moved, and upon the conclusion of the mass he followed the casket, which was taken upon the shoulders of the ministers and church bells were rung and masses and prayers said for the repose of the soul of the murdered Minister. The services were of an impressive and imposing character. At 1 o'clock yesterday morning high mass was said in the stately chapel adjoining the Ministry of the Interior. Emperor Nicholas and the Dowager Empress stood with the widow and children of the Minister at the foot of a great mound of flowers, on which rested the casket.

**Father of Assassin Arrested.**  
Helsingfors, Finland, Aug. 1.—The father of Eugene Schumann, the assassin of Gen. Bobrikoff, Governor-General of Finland, has been sent to St. Petersburg under an escort of gendarmes.

**Count Ignatieff Plehve's Successor.**  
London, Aug. 1.—A special despatch from St. Petersburg to The Agency Russ says that Count Ignatieff will succeed the late M. Von Plehve as Minister of the Interior. Nicholas Paulovitch Ignatieff was born at St. Petersburg in 1832, and entered the guard when seventeen years old. Later he was appointed military attaché to Constantinople, and ambassador to Constantinople in 1884. He was appointed Minister of the Interior under Alexander III, but was dismissed in 1882, though he remained a member of the Council of the Empire. He has since been conspicuous as a leader of the Pap-Slavic party in Russia.

**GERMANY'S DEMAND.**  
If Not Complied With Minister Will Leave  
Willemstad, Island of Curacao, Aug. 1.—It is reported that Herr Feilchen, the German Minister at Curacao, has delivered a ultimatum demanding the immediate payment of the Venezuelan Government of the interest on the amount of the award to be paid to Germany as stipulated in the protocol signed by Herr W. Bowen, representing Venezuela, in February, 1903. If this demand is not complied with the report says the Minister will leave Curacao, Aug. 4.

**ONTARIO'S PREMIER HOME.**  
Says He Had a Good Time and Looks Well Again.

Toronto, Aug. 1.—Hon. George W. Ross, Premier of Ontario, arrived in the city from Buffalo on the 4.10 train Saturday afternoon. He was evidently feeling very well, and looked as if his prolonged visit at Hot Springs, Virginia, had benefited him greatly. His color was remarkably healthy, and he was in a most enjoyable mood with my trip and with the results.

### HIS DEATH SUDDEN

**Prof. Campbell Succumbs to Clot of Blood on Brain.**  
**AT MUSKOKA ISLAND HOME**

His Unexpected Demise Was a Great Shock to His Friends—Sketch of His Career—Until a Few Weeks Ago Was Professor of Church History and Apologetics in Presbyterian College, Montreal.

Port Cockburn, Muskoka, Aug. 1.—Prof. John Campbell died suddenly at his summer home, Yo Ho Island, seven miles from here, Saturday morning. His death was entirely unexpected, as the professor seemed to be in the best of health when he came here from the general assembly at St. John, N.D., in June, and on the 22nd of the summer he was at Muskoka. It will be remembered that Prof. Campbell resigned his place as professor of church history and apologetics in the Presbyterian College at Montreal last June. The occasion of his resignation was the appointment of a successor to Principal McVicar.

**Career of the Dead Scholar.**  
John Campbell was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1849. He was educated at Roxburgh House Preparatory School, London, and on the continent. His father, the late James Campbell, the well-known Toronto publisher, designed him for commercial life. John Campbell was in a business occupation first in New York and afterwards in Toronto, till 1881, when he entered Toronto University. He was a member of the University Company and fought at Ridgeway in 1869, and while a student helped Robert Baldwin to establish the Y.M.C.A. at Toronto. Completing his theological course in the New College, Edinburgh, he was ordained in 1868, and became minister of the Church of Scotland, Presbyterian Church, Toronto, where he remained until he was called to his life work in the Presbyterian College, Montreal. Prof. Campbell was married in 1875 to Mary Helen, eldest daughter of John S. Playfair, and a cousin of Lord Playfair.

**Funeral in Toronto.**  
Toronto, Aug. 1.—The body of the late Prof. Campbell arrived from Gravenhurst early on Sunday morning and was conveyed to the residence of his sister, Mrs. J. Hubert Mason, "Ermine," 67 Sherbourne street. It was accompanied by Mrs. Campbell, Gerald Campbell, youngest son of deceased, Mrs. Mason and Miss Playfair. The funeral will take place this afternoon at three o'clock, and the interment will be at the Necropolis, where Prof. Campbell and his mother are buried. Death was due to a clot of blood on the brain. The deceased left a family of three sons, Dr. J. P. Campbell of the Montreal General Hospital staff, "Ermine," 67 Sherbourne street, and John Campbell, surgeon on a steamer now on its way to the west coast of Africa, and Gerald, who was with his father in Muskoka.
