

LONDON, Jan. 30.-The foreign office has received a telegram from Consul General Murray at Warsaw reporting that himself and Vice-Consul Mucukain were charged by Russian cavalry-men engaged in clearing the streets of Warsaw. It appears that Mr. Murray is slightly deaf and probably did not hear the approach of the troopers and when he subsequently endeavored to make known his personality it was without avail. The foreign office has telegraphed to Ambassador Hardinge to make urgent representations at St. Petersburg on the subject.
