Rev. H. A. Bonnell, of Tracy Mills, has sent in his resignation to the United Baptist church here to take effect June 1st. His many friends will be very sorry to hear of his intention to leave as he has been a most devoted minister and is loved by all.

Robert Ivey was living on what is known as the Ivey farm, Bel River Lake. The house was burned in the morning of April 22nd. He lost all his household effects. Mr. Ivey has a family of 8 small children to care for.

The North End carries the banner for disturbances as the police report being called into a house on Main street to quell a row between William and Daniel Daley. The house of Duncan Hewett on Brook street was the scene of another disturbance and the police claim that Duncan was beating his wife.

The City Cornet Band will in a few days call for tenders for the erection of the new band stand over the fountain in King Square. Some changes have been made by F. Neil Brodie, the architect, in the original plans. The columns will be inside the basin. At the request of the city directors the structure will be fourteen feet higher than the old one. Some minor changes will also be necessary in the shape of the dome.

The dwelling house of J. Fred Saunders of Monument St., was burned about 7 o'clock in the evening of April 22nd. The building was two story dip roof with all, woodshed, granary and hog house attached, about one hundred and fifty bushels of oats, a pig ready for killing for meat, a sleigh, potatoes in the cellar, all his clothing with the exception of what he had on, his wife's clothes and a sum of money besides all the contents of the oil part in fact almost all his household effects were consumed. The house was all finished and well furnished. At the lowest estimate his loss is \$1700. He had a small insurance—Sentinel.

His body was taken to Stidde and buried in the family lot. He leaves a father, mother, two sisters and five brothers, also a large circle of friends to mourn their sad loss. **STANDS ON HIS HEAD TO EARN MONEY**

The World Seems Upside Down to Chas. McLaughlin

Little Fellow on the Millidgeville Road Who Has Become Quite a Favorite

To little Charlie McLaughlin the world very often looks upside down. But this does not matter. He is never disheartened, and the reason is that he himself makes things appear the wrong way. It is his business. There are a number of peculiar things about Charlie. Most people earn their living by being upright. With him the contrary is the case. He supports himself, literally and actually, by standing on his head.

Charlie is a pathetically deformed little chap, living on the Millidgeville road near the junction of the Indian town road. He has been deformed since birth, and now when he should be a tall, hearty boy, he is scarcely three feet high. But this great misfortune has not daunted him. Never having experienced the satisfaction of possessing a normal physique he scarcely realizes what he suffers, but lives his own cheerful and merry life, taking his part in the sport of his chums, and in his duties around home, with entire forgetfulness of his suffering.

Charlie has become an institution on the Millidgeville Road, and the summer is his busy season. He is known familiarly to every member of the yacht club, and to many others who pass along the road. His unvarying cheerfulness has made him popular with all.

Charlie can stand on his head. He can do it just as easily as he can stand on his feet. He can remain in that topsy-turvy position for almost any length of time and can recover his proper position without the least effort. True, as his stature is not great, the end-for-end turn is not a serious proposition in his case, and by continued practice he has become almost incredibly expert.

Many carriages pass along the Millidgeville road daily and Charlie is always on hand to greet the passengers. "Stand on your head, Charlie," they call out, and Charlie very gravely inverts himself. Then five cents or a copper is thrown out. With an entirely appropriate sense of the serious nature of his business, Charlie does not call out "thank you," nor does he take off his cap. He solemnly raises his foot, until the toe touches his cap, in salute, perhaps only once, perhaps two or three times, and runs off to meet the next wagon. It is not a kick, in which Charlie indulges. It is a deliberate and graceful acknowledgement of favor received. The salute, however, is more artistic than the standing on the head.

Altogether Charlie is an unfortunate lad who is making the most of his life, by being cheerful and happy under a serious handicap.

**SHE LIVED UNDER FOUR BRITISH SOVEREIGNS**

Mrs. Elizabeth Beckwith Who Died Today Has Also Seen Four Generations of Her Family

There passed away at the residence of Mr. David B. Dolg, 172 Carmarthen street, this morning, a lady who has seen four reigning sovereigns in Britain. Mrs. Elizabeth Beckwith, who until a few weeks ago had enjoyed exceptionally good health, Mrs. Beckwith had also the happiness of living to see the fourth generations of both sides of her family. Death, which came after an illness of several weeks was due to the weakness of old age.

Mrs. Beckwith was born in Scotland and for many years resided near London where her husband made his home. She came to St. John upwards of 20 years ago and has since resided with her daughter, Mrs. Dolg. Mrs. Beckwith was 91 years of age. She is survived by her daughter, three grandsons, George, Fred, and Allen E. of Montreal, and Fred Dolg of St. John; and three great grandchildren, two in Brandon and the other, the child of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Dolg. There are also a number of relatives in Britain.
