ST. JOHN CO. COUNCIL Grapples With the Smallpox Situation With Vigor

Twenty Two Thousand Dollars Voted if Necessary to Stamp Out the Pest.

Willing to Do Its Fuil Share Towards Providing Another Emergency Hospital-Lompulsory Vaccination in the Coun y.

A special meeting of the Municipal Council was held at the Court House Tuesday, 19th inst., when it was decided to pay over to the board of nealth for the payment of expenses already incurred in connection with the smallpox epidemic the sum of \$4.-900. It was next determined to place \$5.000 more at the disposal of the board to enable them to exert their efforts for the next few weeks in the extermination of the disease. Provision was made, in view of the fact that the council do not meet till late in January, for the payment of \$3,000 more to the board of health in case they need it. After this a committee of the council was named to act with the board of health in the provisie of an additional epidemic hospital and this joint committee has authority to spend \$10,000 in case they consider it necessary. This means an expenditure of \$22,000 provided the board of health ask for all that is rovided for them and joint committe go to the limit of their allowance. The council also decided to ask th

We have striven, on the lines laid down by Washington, to cultivate friendly relations with all powers, but not to take part in the formation of groups or combinations among them. A position of complete independence is not incompatible with relations involving not friendship alone but concurrent action as well in important emergencies. We have kept always in view the fact that we are pre-eminently a peace loving people; that our normal activities are in the direction of trade and commerce; that the vast development of our industries im-peratively demands that we shall not only retain and confirm our hold on our present markets but seek constantly, by all honorable means, to extend our com-mercial interests in every practicable direc-tion. It is for this reason we have negotiat-ed the treaties of reciprocity which new await the section of the senate, all of them conceived in the traditional American spirit of protection to our own industries, and yet mutually advantageous to ourselves and our neighbors. 


