ALDERMEN ARE NOT MIXERS OF MUD, SAYS AID. FRINK

Chairman, at Meeting of Water Board, Defends Council from Responsibility for Condition of Concrete Pipe—Work, He Says, Was Passed by Engineers—Repairs So Far Have Cost \$2,400—Director Believes Work Will Prove Effective—Much Other Business.

At a meeting of the Water and Sewerage Board yesterday afternoon Director Murdoch reported satisfactory progress with the repairing of the concrete water pipe and expressed the opinion that the whole stretch of pipe could be repaired and would not have to be taken up. The cost of repairs so far has been \$2,400.

On motion of Aid. Scully, the director was empowered to get some information on the subject for the next meeting of the board.

Concrete Pipe Repairs. The whole stretch of the water supply pipe work to be repaired was reported on by the director and the work had been passed by the engineers. The aldermen, he believed, were not mixers of mud.

The first matter considered was the discharge of sewerage into the I. C. R. culvert crossing the railway yard from Celebration street to the neighborhood of Meadow street.

On motion of Aid. Scully, the director was empowered to reply to Mr. Jones to this effect.

The director recommended that a catch basin be not placed in Military Road as petitioned by Mr. Thos. Coaker and others, as sufficient money had not been voted by the Common Council for sewerage maintenance.

Cost of Catch Basin. The chairman said it had been found necessary to curtail sewerage work which had already been ordered, and there was not much hope for new catch basins.

The director explained that the catch basins put in 30 years ago were made entirely of wood and these had almost completely rotted out.

It was recommended by the director that \$25 damages claimed by Mrs. Ald. Hayes' wife for damage done to her property in Brussels street by a fallen sewer, be paid.

The director stated that the level of the water in the dam was below the level of the field. Mr. Kane had offered to sell his whole farm for \$1,000, but he wanted \$600 for the damages to the one field.

The chairman expressed surprise that Mr. Kane had not put in his claim at the time the other property holders were satisfied.

The director was authorized to communicate with Mr. Kane regarding the price of his farm.

A petition from residents of the Sand Cove Road District asking for a water supply was ordered filed.

SEVENTY-FIVE CITIZENS WHO EARN \$3,000

List of St. John Tax Payers Who Have Personal Incomes of That Amount or Over.

The list of St. John taxpayers indicates that there are in the city some seventy-five men having an income of \$3,000 and over from personal services.

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INDICATIONS POINT TO CONSERVATIVE SUCCESS

Hon. W. J. Bowser, Attorney-General of British Columbia, Speaks of Political Feeling in the West—Is Returning from Visit to England—Says Pacific Province is Developing Fast—Large Wheat Shipments Expected—Tide of Immigration Flowing.

Remembered in St. John as a speaker of great weight and ability, while taking part in the Federal campaign here last October, Hon. W. J. Bowser, Attorney General of British Columbia, was in the city yesterday.

Asked as to the wider prospect for Conservative success in the next Dominion election, Hon. Mr. Bowser said: "As far as I can see, the tide of every reason to be hopeful, the leading provinces now under Conservative rule are more than satisfied with the handling of the Government and there is every indication that the country at large will return Mr. Borden at the next election."

The fierce attack of the Vancouver World on the McBride Government for alleged subordination to the large holders of crown lands in British Columbia, and the charge of favoring the granting of perpetual leases was mentioned to Mr. Bowser, but he declined to state the position of the Government.

Mr. Bowser is returning to the West in time to attend the Alaska-Yukon Pacific Exposition at Seattle at which British Columbia is well represented.

Shipments of Wheat. Another question put to Mr. Bowser touched on the aggressive efforts of Vancouver to secure shipments of the Northwest wheat from the Pacific terminal of the C. P. R.

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INQUIRY IN SUSSEX

Premier Hazen, To Investigate Charges Tomorrow Against Police Magistrate Hornbrook.

The Hon. J. D. Hazen, who at the last meeting of the Government was appointed a Commission to hold an inquiry into charges made against Mr. Joseph Hornbrook of improper conduct in the discharge of his duty as Police Magistrate of the Town of Sussex, will open the investigation there tomorrow morning at ten o'clock.

The charges are contained in the petition of Mr. John E. McAuley, Mr. Wm. Jamieson and Mr. Allan Price, Councillors of the Municipality of Kings County, who are also an Advisory Board for the enforcement of the law under the Canada Temperance Act.

Mr. Hornbrook has denied the charges, and contends that he will welcome an investigation. Mr. Geo. W. Fowler will appear for the petitioners, and Mr. A. A. Williams for Mr. Hornbrook.
