New York, April 15—Stmr St. Laurent (Fr) reports April 2, lat 45 55 N, lon 47 W, encountered field ice extending in a N.E. and S.W. direction. Skirted the edge of the ice to lat 45 12 N, lon 48 36 W, where a short and narrow passage through the ice was found. At the latter position the ice was seen extending toward the S.W. Also saw two icebergs, one in lat 45 08 N, lon 48 30 W, and the other in lat 45 07 N, lon 48 29 W.

German steamship Husula, 1295 tons, from Sheet Harbor, N. S., to west Ireland, died east Ireland, deals 345 6d. April.
British schooner W. N. Zwicker, 396 tons, from Philadelphia to Lunenburg, N. S., hard coal p.

Shipping Notes.

Furness line steamship Rappahannock, Captain Hanks, goes to sea this morning bound for London via Halifax, with a general cargo, including a lot of grain.
Captain Carter of the schooner Arthur M. Gibson, at New York from St. John, reports on April 5, twenty-five miles west of Seal Island, during a heavy southeast snow storm, Theodore Anderson, aged 24, a seaman, fell overboard and was drowned before assistance could reach him.
Thomas Hartley, of the fishing schooner Matthew S. Green, now at Boston, was drowned at Brown's Banks, Sunday, April 9, while hauling trawls during a heavy snow storm. Hartley was a native of Newfoundland, and was 30 years old and single. A brother was lost when the steamer Portland founded in 1893.
West India line steamer Sobo, Captain Bridges, will not reach St. Kitts until the end of the week. She was two days late in leaving St. Kitts.
C. P. R. steamer Montezuma, from Antwerp, with 2,609 passengers, the largest number ever brought to St. John on a steamer, will reach port today. Steamer Sankah, of the Canada line, with more than 1,900 from Rotterdam, is expected on Wednesday. These two boats are bringing more than 4,500 immigrants to Canada and other steamers during the week will double that number.
The Allan liner Victorian sailed from Liverpool yesterday for Halifax with mails and passengers. Owing to the large amount of ice in the Gulf, it is quite likely that the steamer scheduled to sail from Liverpool for the Gulf this week, will come to Halifax and St. John.
The diversion of European emigration from the United States to Canada is said to be seriously affecting the Atlantic steamship lines. The Red Star line, for instance, has had to operate special emigrant steamers, the Gothland and the Samland. These vessels heretofore in the Antwerp-New York service are now to be operated from Rotterdam to Canadian ports.—N. Y. Maritime Register.

THEY ASK FOR UNIFORM LAW ON MARRIAGE

Toronto, Ont., April 17—A month

ago a committee representative of the several Protestant denominations was appointed by the Toronto ministerial association to investigate the "intemperance" and married marriage question. The committee secured legal advice and the following resolution submitted to a meeting of the ministerial association this morning, is the result of its deliberations:
1.—That we affirm the following principles:
(A) The equality of all religions and their ministers before the law.
(B) The binding character of any marriage performed according to law, by any person authorized by law to do so.
2.—That the promulgation and enforcement of this no temer decree of the Roman church, especially with reference to mixed marriages, is a violation of each of the foregoing principles. We therefore earnestly protest against the enforcement of this decree in Canada especially in view of the fact that it has been successfully resisted in Germany and Hungary.
It is our conviction that the criminal code should be so amended that it shall be made a criminal offence for any man to declare any legally contracted marriage null and void, or to use his influence to secure the separation of husband and wife, except on grounds and by processes recognized by the law of the land."
3.—That whereas it appears that in the province of Quebec, the Canon law of Rome, with reference to marriage has been made a part of the civil law and under it the courts have annulled marriages between Roman Catholics performed by Protestant ministers, we declare that this is a condition not to be tolerated, as it is inconsistent with those principles of British freedom. We urge the Dominion and British governments to take what steps may be required to remedy this state of affairs and if necessary to seek an amendment to the British North America act removing marriage from the jurisdiction of the provinces, and creating a uniform Canadian marriage law.
