Problems of a Young Housewife



KEEPING ACCOUNTS SHOWS THE LEAK.

The accounting of all domestic expenses may seem an irksome task to the young housewife. She knows that she has to buy certain staples to keep the house going and she cannot see that setting down an account of her purchases will make any difference in the ultimate result. When she sees the accounting of her expenditures, she is often so appalled that she decides from sheer panic that she will no longer view them in black and white, since she cannot change her system of living by the bookkeeping.

Women Who Smoke are Considered Indolent

Discussion of Breach of Promise Suit Brings Out Contradictory Opinions of Women Who Use Weed.

New York, Dec. 30.—Clubwomen, discussing the remarkable \$25,000 breach of promise suit brought in Chicago by Miss Katherine Scott against Col. Harry Sefton, owner of theatres in the Windy City, because he broke the engagement when he learned she smoked cigarettes, are divided in their opinion over the man's extraordinary action. Several women maintain that the "Colonel" did "just right" in refusing to marry a woman who smoked. Others declare "any man who broke an engagement for this reason showed a weak character."

Among the latter was Mrs. John Sherwin Crosby, president of the Woman's Democratic Club. Mrs. Crosby said: "A man who would impulsively cast off a woman's love for such a reason must be a weakling. I should think the young woman was fortunate in not marrying him. I believe the time is coming when smoking among women will be more general than it is now. I do not smoke myself, and I should not encourage it in others, but I cannot see what harm it does."

"Many women who drink cocktails are not criticized. The same women if they smoked would be severely criticised. Drinking cocktails is indolence. Smoking cigarettes is indolence. A woman never got drunk on cigarettes. A Cad, Says Mrs. Crosby. "A man who does not smoke himself, but who sees his wife smoke, and really loved the young woman, he should have married her and reformed her. For a man to change his mind about a woman's love on a slight thing is not worthy of her affection. He is a cad."

WEDS SISTER OF HIS DIVORCED WIFE

Pittsburg Man's Bride was Named in Proceedings and Sued by Her Sister for \$10,000.

Pittsburg, Pa., Dec. 29.—Henry C. Baxmeir, a local corporation official has married Miss Sophia M. Baxmeir, the sister of the woman who divorced him a short time ago. The wedding took place on December 12, but was kept a secret until today. Mr. Baxmeir's wife obtained her decree on October 11, and her sister, the present Mrs. Baxmeir, was named in the petition. Prior to that the first Mrs. Baxmeir entered suit against her sister for \$10,000 damages.

BRAVE MOTHER MAKES HERSELF SACRIFICE

New York, Dec. 30.—Mrs. Celia Dimitri, 27 years old, stepped from the rear platform of a Westchester avenue car at St. Ann's avenue, yesterday, in front of a two-ton automobile truck. Her baby, two months old, was in her arms, and she held the baby as far from the truck as possible. In another instant she was hurled to one side and, in falling, she raised the infant above her head. Mrs. Dimitri was unconscious and cut in several places when picked up, but the baby was uninjured. Dr. Cohen of Lebanon Hospital said that one of Mrs. Dimitri's feet had been crushed and that the driver had been badly lacerated. She was also suffering from internal injuries, he thought.

failed to take accountings of his business would certainly go bankrupt. For accountings is the basis of improvement. When you find out where the leak is, the repairing of it is not a hard matter.

A simple accounting system may be devised by any young man, whether or not she has any knowledge of bookkeeping. One likely to cover her usual expenditures would provide volumes for groceries, meats, vegetables, miscellaneous household expenses, personal expenses of husband and wife, and luxuries, such as theatres and other amusements.

The General Cost of Living. The rent bill, the provision bills, the electric light or gas bill, all are elements that combine to make the first of the month a time of worry and possible unhappiness to young couples honestly trying to live within their income.

So many domestic birds have gone to wreck on the rocks of the cost of living that the housewife's problem of making both ends meet is one of the most vital that confronts her.

Even in the romantic days of the engagement a young woman should consider just exactly how she will be able to manage a household on the amount of money her future husband can afford.

In one of the most interesting books of years, "One Way Out," a writer describes how he and his wife and son moved from a suburban home to a city tenement after he had lost his position and faced absolute want.

Finishing work as a day laborer, he earned \$9 a week. Their rent was \$3 for three rooms. His wife's buying list for one week totalled less than \$5 and included enough for three excellent meals a day. She showed her special talent in her management.

She eliminated luxuries and varied what she did her buying wherever she found the best at the cheapest rates. Besides this, she had a complete system of bookkeeping.

DENONCES "GUSH" PATRONIZING CRIPPLED CHILDREN

Dr. Douglas C. Murtrie Says Patronizing Crippled Children Has Demoralizing Effect Upon Victim.

New York, Dec. 30.—Patronizing crippled children in the name of charity is denounced by Dr. Douglas C. Murtrie, of this city, on the ground that it is demoralizing to the unfortunate young persons. At the same time he inveighs against their exhibition in charity fairs and bazaars, which makes capital of their deformities. These views he expresses in the current number of the New York Medical Journal.

Dr. Murtrie suggests that due care should be taken not to pauperize such children, and that especially when work is carried on in their behalf under private philanthropic auspices the idea of charity, as far as the children themselves are concerned, should be eliminated.

"The practical way," he continues, "in which this demoralizing influence manifests itself is only too common in some organizations. The most frequent fault lies in the commiserating attitude of some persons engaged in the work, namely, those not doing daily work but rather responsible for its inception and support. They will go around an institution often with friends addressing the children as 'poor little' or 'poor little' and under private philanthropic auspices the idea of charity, as far as the children themselves are concerned, should be eliminated."

"The general spirit in such institutions in many cases impresses on the children how much is being done for them, with the ultimate aim that the crippled child should be to make his position and attitude as normal as possible. When he goes from under the beneficent influence of such an institution he becomes indolent and retains the best type of self respect he must make his own way on his own merits."

The future should always be considered. That it is not given as much attention in this country as it should be is due perhaps to the fact that most of the institutions are so young that they have no graduates or too few to allow any valid deductions from actual experience. Furthermore, most of the older institutions place their emphasis almost exclusively on the element of surgical care and treatment.

"Some institutions have been indulging in a practice of raising money at fairs or bazaars at which crippled children are the principal attractions. One particularly pernicious instance of this is an annual fashionable fair where the little cripples are exhibited in a vaudeville show. They limp around the stage as best they can, performing their stunts, and as might be imagined, the sympathies of the audience or at least as much of it as is susceptible to such melodrama—are worked upon, so that at the accompanying fair they are easily prevailed upon to take the immortunities offered chances in lotteries or on roulette wheels or to buy some of those useless articles forced upon them by social acquaintances whom they feel unwilling to rebuff or offend."

The editor of the Medical Journal, commenting upon this, warns against the tendency to patronize and gush, and urges wise encouragement for the crippled child.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LANDS

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Six months' residence on each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$100.
