KEEPING THE THEATRES OUT ALREADY

Some of the Local Picture Theatres are Putting New Law Into Effect Ahead of Time.

Preparatory to a possible rigid enforcement of the revised moving picture laws, which will go into effect on January 1st, managers of some of the local theatres are insisting upon the younger patrons of their theatres being of a more mature age.

A Standard reporter last night witnessed several children apparently not over 12 years of age, being refused admission to one of the prominent moving picture theatres and being advised that in order to see the pictures they must be present at the afternoon performance or obtain an adult companion as guardian in the evening.

Coincident with the move the Nickel has increased the number of its 10 cent seats to 300 leaving 700 to be obtained for five cents. The shrinkage due to the new tax and the ban placed on children is given as the reason.

P. G. Spencer who owns the Unique and the Lyric theatres, is averse to committing himself in regard to his plans for the future. He points out that the expenses of running the two theatres have increased \$3,000 in the past two years. He declares that he is giving the matter of raising prices consideration.

QUARREL IN BRITISH COMMONS SETTLED

London, Nov. 18.—An amicable agreement of the home rule quarrel in the House of Commons was brought about today when the dispute as to the government method of procedure which led to such disorder last week, was settled.

The government announced this afternoon its intention of reaching the end it desired by a more roundabout means and the Unionists having made good their demand for the observance of precedent raised no objection.

Mr. Asquith attributed his change of mind, partly to repugnance at the prospect of a recurrence of disorder, and partly to a desire not to ignore the appeal of the chair.

The House of Commons then on the motion of the premier negatived its original financial resolution, the amendment of which by Sir Frederick Banbury in committee, led to the trouble. Another resolution will be substituted for it.

The net result of the squabble will be to delay the progress of the Home Rule Bill for ten days.

AN ATTACK ON "RALPH CONNOR"

Winnipeg Telegram Hands it to Famous Author in Editorial Dealing with Synod Resolution.

Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 18.—Under the heading, "The same old game by the same old boy," the Telegram makes an editorial attack on the Rev. Charles W. Gordon, (Ralph Connor), for being the "presumptuous author" of the resolution passed by the Presbyterian Synod at Brandon criticizing the government's motives during the recent MacDonald election.

"Gordon," said the Telegram, "is a man entirely under the domination of his passions and prejudices and incapable of sane judgment on any matter even remotely connected with politics. This is so recognized that people have come to treat him more with pity and consideration rather than with the contempt he would otherwise merit."

"His fixed idea has been brooded over by an ill-balanced mind so long that it is probably imbedded in some physiological alteration in the brain structure which greatly diminishes his responsibility if it does not entirely remove it. No doubt the Synod was far more occupied with the immediate problem of keeping Gordon in a soothed condition than with the terms or the implication of the resolution.

"If so, its motives in getting through with the matter were praiseworthy and will be sympathized with by those who know the reverend gentleman. Argument, expostulation and opposition are hopeless. They only lead the Gordon type to confound with the prince of darkness, any who oppose their cause. The Gordons of this world must either be humored or restrained, when their monomania is touched.

"To accuse Gordon of calculated hypocritical malignity from the fact that outrage practiced in the interests of the liberal party cause no mental reaction to him would be absurd. Such things do not touch him because they don't strike the nerve centre where the disease lies."
