Continued from page 1. In their view the act of Congress, when it declares that no tolls should be levied on ships engaged in the coasting trade of the United States...

A Denial of Equal Rights

In their opinion the mere conferring by Congress of power to fix lower tolls on United States ships, than on British ships, amounts to a denial of the right of British shipping to equality of treatment...

As respects the suggestion contained in the last paragraph but one of your note, under reply, His Majesty's government conceive that article 1, of the treaty of 1895 so clearly meets the case that it has no arisen, that it is sufficient to put its provisions in force in whatever manner the two governments may find the most convenient...

His Majesty's government has not desired me to argue in this note, all the view they take of the main issue, the proper interpretation of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty, is the correct view but only that a case for the determination of that issue has already been made and now exists. They conceive that the interest of both countries requires that issue to be settled promptly before the opening of the canal and by means which will leave no ground for regret or complaint.

The avoidance of possible friction has been one of the main objects of these methods of arbitration of which the United States has been for so long a foremost and consistent advocate. His Majesty's government think it more in accordance with the general arbitration treaty that the statement desired should precede rather than follow the doing of any actual damage...

ST. LAWRENCE PILOTS HAVE GOOD SIGHT

But Oculist Testifying in Quebec Pilotage Commission Declares He Passed Pilots Who Wore Eye Glasses.

Quebec, March 2.—At the meeting of the pilot commission on Saturday, Dr. J. D. Page, oculist, said he was appointed examiner of the pilots' eyesight in 1906 by a letter from the deputy minister of marine. He found some of the pilots wearing glasses and was instructed that if the men were otherwise healthy, to pass them.

As to the color test, he learned that some of the men never had any acquaintance with the skeins, and did not know certain colors. At a medical convention in Toronto in 1907, he heard a Canadian doctor state that the right test of masters and mates in Canada was useless, saying that he had asked a man who had passed as a mate: "Is that a horse or a cow in the field?" The man replied: "I think it is a horse."

Dr. Page said since he has been examining pilots, some have been put out, and he found a few who have had their sight affected by the abuse of alcohol. He would suggest that no man added to the abuse of liquor should be allowed to be a pilot, for one never knows the time his sight will be affected.

He considered the present examination of pilots to be good. The test for applicants should be higher than that for masters and mates. The British Trinity House calls for a higher standard than the British Board of Trade. Many of the so-called experts rejected men for poor eyesight who were only suffering from a slight temporary ailment. All tests of the eyes should be made by an oculist, a general practitioner covers the surface only, while the oculist goes down to the root. As to the pilots he found their sight generally good.

POETESS AND PRIEST CHARGED WITH MURDER

Paris Has New Sensation in Astonishing Crime—Wrote Ardent Poems to Man She Loved.

Paris, March 2.—Paris is nothing without its sensation. Just now, Mme. Crespy, a poetess, is charged with the murder of Abbe Chassary. A number of papers and letters were found in the case have disappeared and it is thought that they have been destroyed to avoid as much scandal as possible. But there is enough. A number of letters have been found in the possession of the lady. They mostly commenced: "Ma Veronique" or "My little Veronique," and Mme. Crespy pointed out that the letters were all marked with a small cross, which was a token agreed upon to indicate that she might keep them, and on the envelope was written "L'Autre."

In her poems, Mme. Crespy distinguished between the mystic love which she bore to the priest by addressing her more extravagant letters to "Lui" whilst to the simple man she adored she wrote as "L'Autre."

A number of empty envelopes had contained effusions which under the seal of the confessional she had sworn to the abbe to destroy, and therefore had feared to preserve. The letters found in the abbe's desk left no doubt as to the sentimental relations between him and Mme. Crespy, but three others taken from his pockets one of which of recent date, beginning "Mon Gros Louche," showed that the ardent young priest had not proved insensible to the charms of another lady of Agen.

This did not amount to much, and Mme. Crespy, who was assisted by her lawyer, continued with tears to protest her complete innocence. On leaving the court house she was greeted with a hostile demonstration from the crowd assembled outside.

FIGHTING AT TRIPOLI

Tripoli, March 2.—Several hundred Arabs attacked an Italian post, but were repulsed with heavy losses. They left thirty-five dead and wounded, others in addition to the wounded. On the Italian side two native soldiers were killed and an officer was wounded.

ACCIDENT TO ROYAL TRAIN. Naples, March 2.—An insignificant accident to the train in which King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Helena were travelling to Naples caused the spread of a rumor today that an attempt had been made against the royal train. The accident was so trivial that it was not noticed by the sovereign. A piece of iron became detached from one of the carriages and striking violently against another carriage, caused some trifling damage.

FUTURE DUKE OF MARLBOROUGH WAS PERSUADED TO FAG

Remonstrance from Home Proved Effective and Now He Makes Beds and Washes Dishes Like Other Juniors.

London, March 3.—The young man who in the natural course of things will one day become the Duke of Marlborough, it appears, has justified much of his American mother's independent spirit. Although she is not the type of woman who would encourage her children in insubordination, the heir, who only went to Eton last fall, soon gave evidence of some what revolutionary temperament.

It is the custom in English public schools for newcomers to perform manual services for senior boys, such as to run errands, straighten up dormitories and scrub up. But the future Duke of Marlborough did not see the joke, and like a man, revolted. He told his mother, straight up, that he would sacrifice his educational prospects and opt for a job in some hotel or apartment house, where he would make beds and wash plates, and the aristocratic young man received a shock. The Duke of Marlborough was communicated with and explanations demanded. With regard to the conduct of his son, the duke, who himself was by no means a paragon of all the virtues in his school days, referred the case to the duchess. Maternal remonstrances have been made, and the aristocratic young man has now submitted to Eton conditions.

HOPEWELL NEWS

Hopewell, Feb. 28.—There has been great bustle among the lumbermen the past week, the arrival of snow bringing lively work to get out the logs, which was feared at one time would have to be left in the woods. Teams for hauling are in great demand and as high as \$70 a month has been offered. The front roads have been excellent for some days and a great deal of hauling has been done. There is a sharp demand for hay, both English and mixed qualities, and prices are away up.

SBYSZKO WON BOUT ON POINTS

New York, March 2.—Stanislas Zbyszko, the Polish wrestler, defeated Paul Samson, the German champion, in a catch-as-catch-can bout limited to forty minutes at the New York Athletic Club tonight. Zbyszko forced Samson to quit with a toe hold in 31 minutes 58 seconds and after a 20 minute intermission, with eight minutes and two seconds of the time limit unexpired, the men went at it again. Zbyszko was nearly all the time on the aggressive, but neither wrestler gained a fall and the match went to the Polish champion on points.

CHAMPIONS WILL BOX IN TORONTO

Toronto, March 1.—By a mail vote of the championship committee of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada today it was decided to hold the annual amateur boxing championships in Toronto as usual, instead of at Vancouver. The British Columbia branch of the union applied for the tournament, but in the light of the fact that the National Track and Field Championships for 1913 have already been awarded to the Pacific Coast province, the committee decided to have the boxers compete in Toronto, as has been the custom.

TO PROTECT BOXING PATRONS

New York, March 1.—The State Athletic Commission took another step to protect boxing patrons. It adopted a rule requiring promoters of fights to make public announcement when boxers advertised to appear in the ring if they cannot do so. Notices of non-appearance are to be posted at box offices, and if there is time sporting writers are to be notified so that announcements can be made in newspapers. Word concerning the commission's action has been sent to all clubs holding boxing licenses in the State.

PARADIS NOW CHAMPION OF THE WORLD

Montreal, March 1.—In two straight falls, Paradis, the New England wrestler, annexed the lightweight championship of the world and won the Police Gazette belt from Eugene Tremblay, at Sahneur Park last night. The first fall took 55 minutes and the second ten. Tremblay, who has held the championship for about seven years, was not fast enough for his more youthful opponent.
