VALUABLE PAINTINGS FOUND. Cheshire Couple Bought for 15 Shillings

What Were Worth Hundreds of Dollars. According to the New York Tribunc London correspondent, three pictures in crusted with grime were recently purchased in a curiosity shop by a thrifty husband and wife in Cheshne, England, for litten shillings. Each of these, when particular-iy cleaned for the adornment of theu modest dwelling, proved to be by a noted painter. Experts were consulted, and one proved to be the work of an early Italian master; another was a Carot, and a third was a painting by an English master. En-couraged by the knowledge that what they had bought for a few shillings was worth \$500, the couple returned to the obscure curiosity shop and bought for \$25 a canvas blackened with age, which was in use for a fire screen. This picture when cleaned disclosed the name "Dei Pompa" in one corner and has been identified as a rare work of an Italian painter. The Cheshire couple are now asking \$25,000 for their treasure trove, for which they gave a single \$25 note.
