Moncton, Jan. 23.—No. 2 express train, running between St. John and Halifax has fallen into the rut of other I. C. R. passenger trains this winter, and seldom reaches Moncton on time. Previous to this season No. 2 was probably the most reliable train on the road for running on schedule time; but now she is almost as irregular as the through trains, and is the cause of much complaint on the part of the traveling public, who depend upon that train to reach their destination on time.

The old excuse—poor engines and bad coal—is given in this case, as in other cases of late trains.

Chatham, Jan. 21.—At the meeting of the municipal council, Inspector Menzies was reappointed and an assessment of \$400 on Scott's account was ordered to meet the deficit between revenue and expense. Inspector Menzies stated in his report that the year's work had been most unsatisfactory. There had been twenty prosecutions, and only seven convictions. The committee appointed to investigate the old jail property, reported it to be in

a dilapidated condition, and recommended that a lease of it be offered at auction for forty-nine years at upset price of \$50 per year.

Con. Morrison stated that the secretary-treasurer had deposited in registry office bonds to the amount of \$13,000.

Con. McColl, of committee appointed to deal with the pedlar question, recommended that the councillors from each parish appoint a special constable for their respective parishes to act as inspectors for this duty and that said constables be notified of this particular duty by the secretary-treasurer; passed. On motion of Con. Pond the following were appointed to transact the business at the July session of the council: Con. Connors, Davidson, Swin, Pond and Fleet.

The following were appointed public wheat committee: Con. Doyle, James Falconer and T. W. Crocker.

A resolution strongly urging the Dominion government to operate the line of railway between Indianton and Blackville was passed.

On motion of Con. Anderson the finance committee were authorized to borrow a sum of money sufficient to carry on the business of the county.

Con. Watt, Davidson and Parker were appointed the finance committee.

Votes of thanks were tendered to Warden Schofield for the efficient manner in which he had presided, to the secretary, treasurer, the auditor and reporters. Adjourned.
