REBUILDING OF LOUVAIN

CANADIAN STUDENT WILL HELP
TO RESTORE TREASURES.

Plans Have Been Made to Restore
Famous Belgian University Which
the Huns Destroyed — Valuable
Books Contributed by the British
and Money-Grubbed United States
Will Provide Cash.

By the free-will offerings of the British people and by the forced gifts of the German universities, the treasures of the library of Louvain University are being restored. From Canada and the United States will come the money and plans for the building itself, to replace that which Kultur ravaged.

Britain vainly attempted to save this great mediaeval treasure, and now hastens to come forward with hundreds of thousands of volumes as gifts toward the restoration.

America, entering the war too late to have any effect on the course of events in Belgium, endeavors handsomely to recognize the valor and worth of that stricken land.

The case of Germany is vastly different and needs no great elaboration. Kultur, so far as has been ascertained, did not steal the books. It simply annihilated them.

On the night of August 25, 1914, the beautiful old building was willfully destroyed. There was no military necessity for it. Perhaps it was drunken fury. Perhaps it was a deliberate attempt to insult Christendom and civilization.

German apologists have said that the treasures of the library were not burned, but that thousands of volumes were taken from the place before the torch was applied. If that is so, where are the books that were saved? Certainly they are not in Belgium.

By the terms of the treaty of Versailles, Germany is compelled to send ten thousand books a month to Louvain in reparation. These books are picked by a committee of scholars selected by Louvain University and confirmed by King Albert.

Are the books in Germany? The libraries of Heidelberg, Leipzig, Jena and Bonn are being carefully combed for literary treasures that will help to repair the damage. But so far not one of the books which filled the old Cloth Market, as it was called, has been found.

Only one manuscript of the old library was saved. Prof. van der Essen, of the university, happened to have at his home manuscript No. 906, which contains the official correspondence of the university from about 1583 to 1637. The rest is dust.

The facts are sufficient verbal condemnation of Germany, as they are also full of honor to the powers that saved civilization. As soon as the war was over, M. De la Tour, president of the French Institute, headed an international committee for the reconstruction. It was felt that a building which had been housing literary gems from 1425 on was not to be left where Germany left it.

De la Tour invited Whitney Warren, of New York and Paris, to become the architect. Last year, Cardinal Mercier approved the plans and President Butler, of Columbia, laid the corner stone. This summer the American Colleges are raising the funds among the undergraduates. If they fail, Pierpont Morgan and other financiers will pay the shot.

Meanwhile Britain has been pouring forth her treasures in bound volumes, manuscripts and prints to provide something which Germany can never yield. The German universities do not hold the greatest treasure trove in literature, for the glad offerings of Oxford and Cambridge, London and Manchester are intrinsically more valuable and sentimentally incomparable.

Already there are enough volumes on hand to make a library which few universities on this continent could approach. Three hundred thousand volumes, including many from France and Italy, are already stored in Louvain, and a fireproof structure must soon be made available, or chance might precipitate a second holocaust.

"Destroyed by the Germans, 1914; restored by America, 1922," reads the inscription on Mr. Warren's plans. That applies to the building, which is the body of which a collection of rare printed matter is the soul. Visible on the balustrade will be the inscription in Latin which, freely translated, reads: "Destroyed by Teutonic Fury; Restored by American Gift."

The cost of the new structure will be \$1,000,000. The memorial tower will rise to a height of 275 feet. The chimneys will play the National Anthems of the four nations, Belgium, France, Britain and America, every hour. Ultimately, two million books will be stored there in the stock rooms inside the Flemish Renaissance pile.

Before the Louvain campaign closes Canada may hear a good deal about it. It is planned to invade the Canadian universities next fall, when the students are in funds. So Canada will have her share in peace as in war in the succor of Belgium. Like Britain, this country rushed to Belgium's aid, crossing the Atlantic with an Armada in weeks instead of years, but alas, too late. This country, however, cannot aid like Britain with books, for our libraries are too young to supply many rare manuscripts. Our gifts will be in money in 1922 as it was in lives seven years ago. And when 1924 rolls around and the final ceremonies are being staged, the Canadian universities will be represented. Their crests will adorn the walls and the names of their students will appear forever (or pending another Hun irruption), on the golden book of donors to the new Louvain. Toronto, McGill, Queens, and all the smaller universities will be asked to participate.

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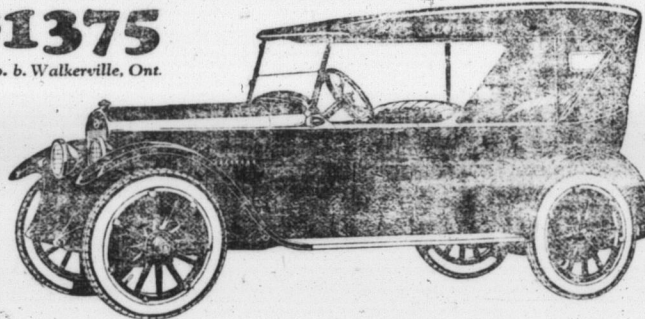
