REGINA, Oct. 28.—H. H. Elliott of the White Shore Chemical Co., states that active work will be started very soon on the development of the sodium sulphate deposits on the shore of White Lake. This is the largest deposit in the Dominion and

according to Mr. Elliott its use will revolutionize the pulp making industry in Canada.

It will increase the output of by-products of the pulp mills from 12, as at present, to more than forty, it is stated. The most important of these being artificial silk which can be manufactured from the pulp.

The deposit is situated northwest of Biggar, west of Olan and close to both the G.T.P. and C.P.R. Operation will commence early next year.

## WILL HAVE MEN IN FIELD FOR MUNICIPAL

Labor Men Hold First Public Meeting for Comm. Candidates so far Named. One Member Puts for Present Council

SEATS ON FOUR BODIES SOUGHT

Labor will have candidates in the field in the coming municipal election. Last evening it was so decided when a public meeting was held under the auspices of the Independent Labor Party in the Trades and Labor Hall.

Nominees will be put up for the City Council, the Water Commission, the Light Commission and the Public School Board. The slate will not be limited to members of the Independent Labor Party.

So far, three candidates have been named, who will stand for office. They are Messrs. W. H. Halliwell, Carl Emmerich and C. J. Massel. President of the Independent Labor Party. This slate, however, will be added to. It is the intention to hold a meeting next month of members of

the Independent Labor Party, to discuss the matter of candidates. The meeting was held over by fifteen citizens who expressed their opinion that labor should be represented on the Council, committees and boards.

ORTHODOX VIEWS AMONG BAPTISTS

OTTAWA, Oct. 30.—The Baptists of Ontario and Quebec have had their widely advertised debate on the subject of the inspiration and authority of the Scriptures and have come through more united to all appearances than ever.

The debate that took place in the convention here yesterday was not a denominational splitting debate, that was expected, for it never in the four and a half hours of its duration was more than one-sided on the main question. Not one of the delegates expressed an unorthodox view.

In the resolution proposed by Rev. Dr. Shields and passed without a dissenting vote the old Baptist doctrine of the Divine inspiration of the old and new testaments and their absolute supremacy and sufficiency in matters of faith and practice was reaffirmed, as was also the doctrine that the Scriptures of the old and new testaments were given by inspiration of God and are the only sufficient and authoritative rule of saving knowledge, faith and obedience.

FOCH INVITES GERMANY TO HELP

PARIS, Oct. 30.—The note sent by Marshal Foch to Gen. Nidua for transmission to the German Government, inviting Germany to participate in the blockade of Bolshevik Russia, is similar to that sent to the neutral states. It reads:

"The avowed hostility of the Bolsheviks towards all Governments and their international program of revolution which they are spreading abroad constitute a grave danger for the national security of all powers. Every increase of strength of the Bolsheviks would increase the danger and would be contrary to the desire of all peoples who are seeking to reestablish peace and social order."

CONSIDERS DRURY A GREAT LEADER

REGINA, Oct. 30.—Commenting on the selection of E. C. Drury as the leader of the U.F.O. in the Ontario Legislature, Hon. Geo. Langley, Vice-President of the Saskatchewan Cooperative Elevator Company, and member of the Canadian Council of Agriculture made the following statement:

"Mr. Drury is not unknown in the West, having been in attendance at more than one Grain Growers' Convention. He is an excellent speaker with a good education. Among all the men who are taking part in the Farmer movement in Ontario he is probably the most capable as a parliamentary leader. He is, however, above and beyond everything else a man of the soil."

"The leader of the Farmers' movement in Ontario must have both courage and restraint. Mr. Drury certainly does not lack courage. He will be prepared to consolidate the voters who have placed his party in its present position."

"It will be equally necessary that he should exercise restraint. The capitalist class which up till now have been the backbone of the Conservative and Liberal parties may be trusted to conserve their forces in the sense that their privileges are threatened."

"We are on the eve of a great experiment in government and the forces which have by the recent election been brought into existence contain nothing that need arouse the fears of those who believe that justice should be the ruling element of Canadian politics. The first test which the U.F.O. has taken by selecting Mr. Drury will be satisfactory to the Farmers' movement in the Dominion."

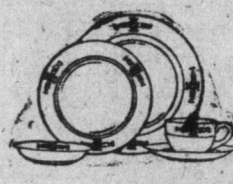
